### Pool Room Owner Fined For Allowing Gambling

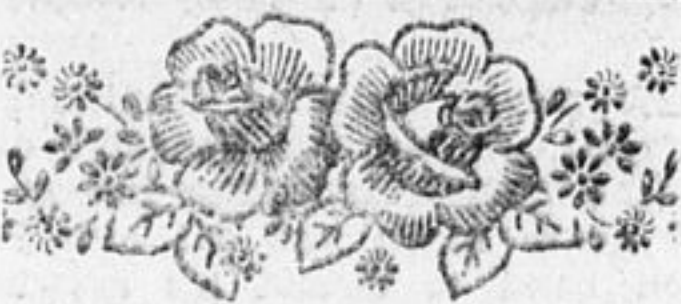
