

Fast And Furious Western at Cartier

Fans who like their action fast and furious will enjoy "Outlaws of Santa Fe" playing at the Cartier Theatre on Friday and Saturday. Don "Red" Barry is likable as the outlaw-turned-marshall, and Wally Vernon, as his pal, stirs up the doings with laughable comedy.

The story concerns a cowboy, played by Barry, who has been brought up among a gang of bandits, believing their leader to be his father. When he discovers that his father actually was a U.S. Marshall, killed in line of duty, Barry decides to go straight and help bring his father's murderer to justice.

This is accomplished with the help of his pal and of an observant child, played by Twinky Watts. Having achieved his objective, Barry surrenders to the law to pay for his previous misdeeds.

Helen Talbot adds an attractive bit of femininity to the proceedings, and Roy Barcroft and LeRoy Mason handle the villainy in thorough-going fashion.

Among added attractions to the program is the comedy, "Twin Husbands," with Leon Errol, and Chapter No. 13 of "The Monster and the Ape."

"The Seventh Veil" Comes To Palace

Outstanding among continental actors to win popularity in motion pictures is Herbert Lom. This distinguished performer, appearing currently in "The Seventh Veil," at the Palace Theatre, was born in Czechoslovakia.

Prominent in the Czech theatre in Prague, he found himself on the Nazi black list after Munich, in 1939, and left the country for England where he studied the language and played in a number of stage and film presentations there.

Stars, Songs, Comedy In "Easy To Wed"

It is during this musical highlight that Ethel Smith, who made her screen bow in "Bathing Beauty," demonstrates again her artistry on the electric organ while Van and Esther dance and sing.

Given 15 Days For Drunk Driving

Leo Rochon of Timmins, pleading guilty to charge of drunk driving in police court here on Tuesday was sentenced to 15 days hard labor, and was prohibited to drive for six months.

There was no one injured in the smash-up at that time, but the driver of the other vehicle is also scheduled to appear on a similar charge.

Visitor To Timmins Drinks, Then Drives; To Be Here 10 Days

George Popescue, a resident of Windsor, spending vacations in Timmins, was sentenced to ten days by Magistrate Atkinson in police court here on Tuesday on a charge of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, his car was impounded for three months and his driver's license suspended for six months.

Popescue was arrested about 10 o'clock on July 27 when he drove his car past a police patrol car on Algonquin Blvd. in erratic fashion, went through a red light and blew his horn needlessly.

Police stated that Popescue was in an

intoxicated condition at the time and offered no explanation for his actions at that time or when informed that he was to be charged with drunk driving.

In court Popescue stated he had left Windsor on the Friday night previous with a friend to visit old ex-service chums in Timmins and had driven all night.

He said his actions were the result of fatigue but admitted drinking a little in the afternoon previous to his arrival and arrest here.

Victim Unconscious Following Assault; Belair Gets Jail

For what was termed by the Crown Attorney as a merciless assault, Alberic Belair, 18-year-old Timmins youth, was sentenced to three months hard labor by Magistrate Atkinson in police court here on Tuesday.

Belair was charged with assaulting Guy Garneau, 20, in front of the Dew Drop Inn on July 18.

Garneau stated Belair had jumped him from behind hit him, knocking him from behind, hit him, knocking him unconscious. Garneau was later revived in the offices of a local doctor.

Each of the men called three witnesses and the evidence of Garneau's

witnesses weighed the stronger.

Garneau's employer stated Belair had said "tell your man to watch out because I'm going to give him a good one." This was said following the day of a court case in which Belair was the complainant and in which, according to Belair, Garneau had given false evidence.

Another witness corroborated Garneau's story, stating that after Belair had knocked Garneau down he had kicked him, banged his head and face into the road, punched his face severely, and then left him unconscious in the roadway.

Garneau said Belair had been after him continually after the court case and that he had made his way from him on two occasions after Belair had struck him.

Belair, much larger than Garneau although younger, was termed a bully by the Court and the magistrate stated that if he persisted in looking for fights the sentence would be increased with his every appearance if he were found guilty.

Liquor Brings Many Into Tuesday Court

One Timmins resident was given the option of a fine of \$50 and costs or sentence of 30 days on a charge of second offence drunkenness by Magistrate Atkinson this week. Five first offence imbibers were fined \$10 and costs.

Fines of \$10 and costs were levied two persons for illegal possession of beer and wine in police court Tuesday and on two persons charged with disorderly conduct. A third person charged with disorderly conduct was assessed \$5 and costs.

Fails To Pay \$35 Fare Charged By Cab Driver

Joseph Thomas, a resident of the Lady Laurier Hotel in Timmins was booked by Timmins police on Tuesday after a charge of false pretenses had been laid against him by Charles Tremblay, a Brunette Taxi driver. Thomas is alleged to have chartered a cab for a trip to Rouyn and had failed to pay the \$35 fare for the passage.

Seek Wood In Bush Find Trouble, Too

A trip into Deloro Township by Roland Fauvel and Clifford Demers, both 29, of McDonald Hill, resulted in their being charged with breaking and entering, and terminated in both being ordered to sign bonds of \$200 to keep the peace for two years in police court here on Tuesday.

Both men stated they had gone into the bush seeking birch for their winter's fuel supply.

They were charged by Constable G. Fulton of the O.P.P. detachment here when he found them leaving the property of the Delcor Mines in Deloro Township. The constable stated the rear of the car contained 8 light bulbs, three lamps, a box of chalk, a prospector's pick without a handle, three hampers, filing boxes, some blank papers, and two electric lights with shades. They were in possession of two wooden sled runners and two lengths of pipe when found by the constable.

John Jones, caretaker of the property for a number of years, and J. W. Lieberman, a barrister and former resident manager of the mine, stated they had not authorized either of the men to enter the property. Mr. Jones stated he had checked all the buildings earlier that evening before going to town and found them all locked.

When he returned Mr. Jones said the men were being held by Constable Fulton.

Magistrate Atkinson stated he would give them a chance as the goods in their possession totalled no more than \$12 in value and that if they had intended to steal, there were articles of more value to be found on the property.

Owner Of Missing Wallet Is Found by Police Dept.

A solution to the mystery of the wallet and the owner was finally found for the Timmins police. The police had a 13 year old girl who found a wallet on Gillies Lake beach but no one reported losing it. On Friday, however, a Timmins resident came in to claim the wallet.

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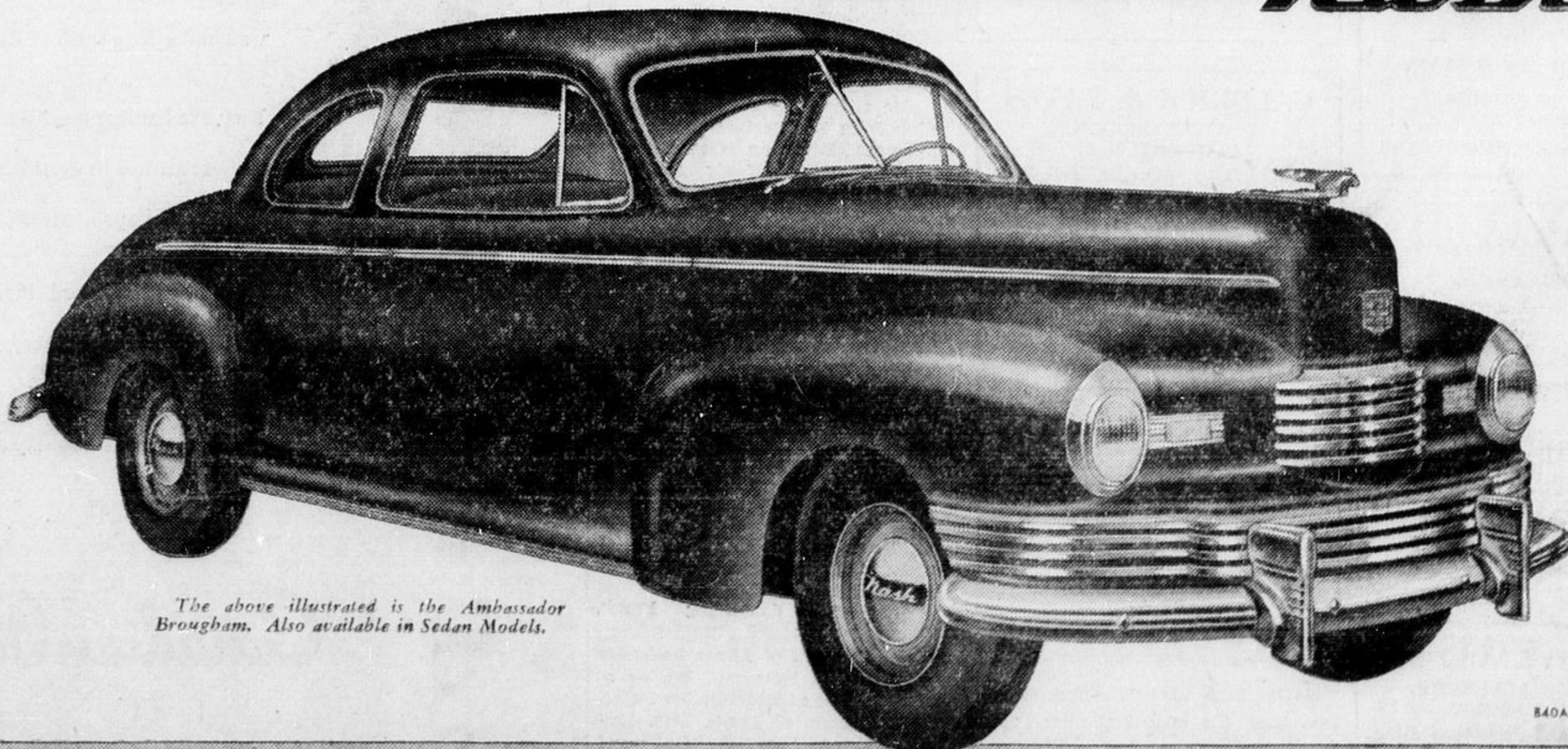
