

# Fourth Straight Win Goes To Hollinger In 5-2 Win Over Macmen

### Talbot Ties Up Macmen To Tighten Hollinger Hold On Playoff Berth

Hollinger Green-shirts tightened their hold on a playoff berth by setting aside the cellar-dwelling Macmen, 5-2 last night.

The Bombers ran their late-season rally to four consecutive games behind the careful pitching of Claude Talbot. This was his fourth win in as many starts.

The Macmen took over the lead in the opening stanza on a brace of Hollinger errors. Webber singled to left field and was thrown out at second on Cook's roller to Chase.

Cook advanced to second on Levandoski's error, stole third and scored when Chase threw Wilson's ground ball over Malott's head.

Eddie Dunn paced the Hollinger attack in the fourth frame with a long triple to right field. Levandoski drove him in with a single to centre. Fleet-footed Levandoski stole second, advanced to third on Catcher Bill Cook's error and romped home with the leading run as Lawton grounded out to Richardson.

The Hollinger squad increased their lead in the sixth, when Chase went to first on Richardson's error. Joe Levandoski came through with his second hit of the game when he rolled a long one to deep short. Chase advanced to

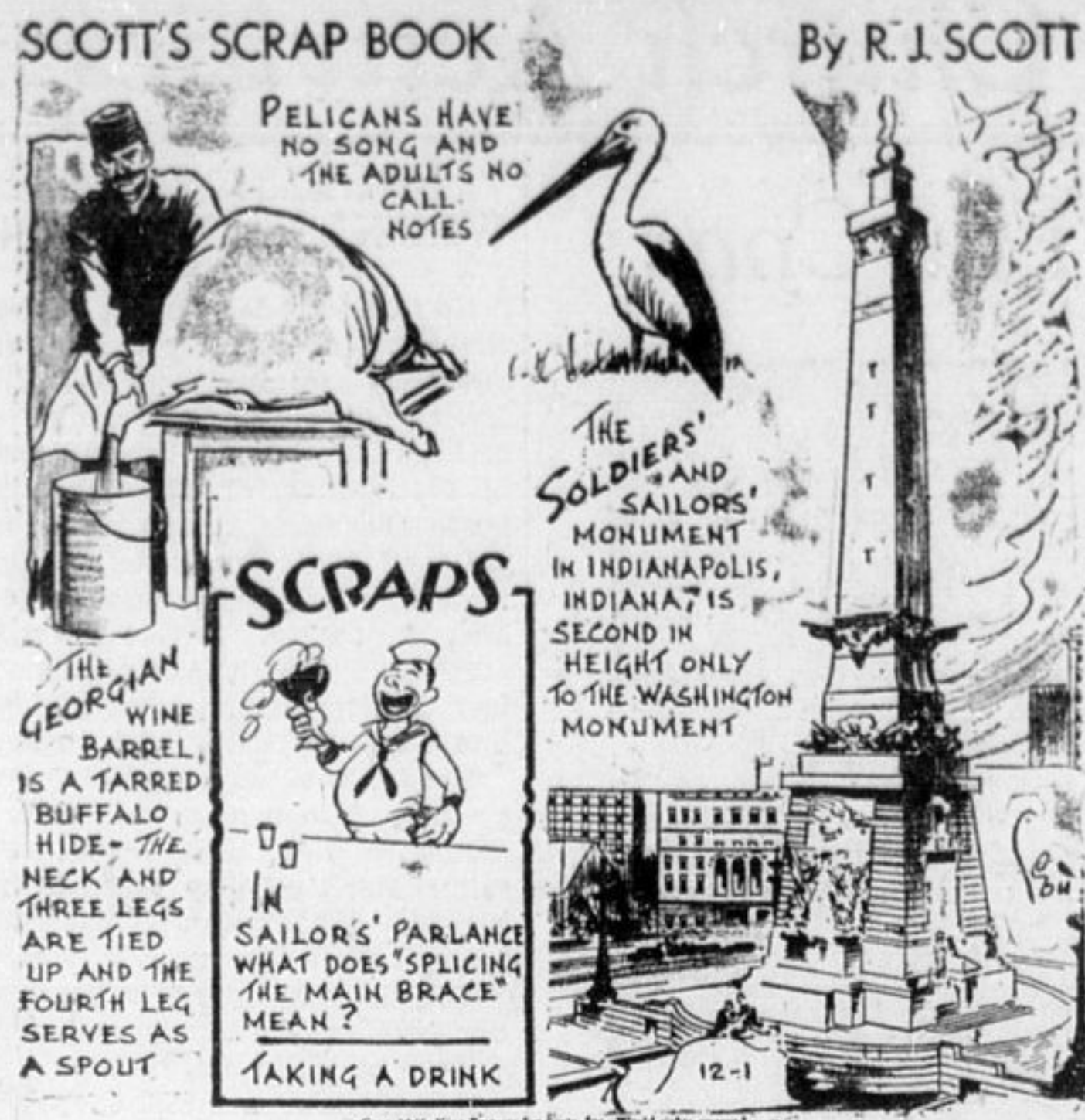
third on Malott's fly to right field and scored when Lawton singled to second base.

The only McIntyre bid came late in the eighth inning. Ted Lister singled to centre and moved into scoring position when Webber grounded to Malott. Bill Cooke was thrown out at first by Hann. Lister advanced to third on the play and scored on a much-disputed balk by pitcher Claude Talbot.

Not satisfied with their one-run lead, the batting Bombers again hit the score sheet in the top half of the final frame. Adamchuck drove out his only hit of the game, a long triple to deep centre. Delmonte doubled along the right field line, scoring Adamchuck. Normie belted out his third hit of the game with a sharp single to right field, sending Delmonte across the plate.

McIntyre came close in their half of the ninth when Narduzzi singled to right field and went to second when right fielder Bill Lawton fumbled the ball. Arnott grounded to Chase, sending Narduzzi to third.

However, Hollinger's air-tight infield checked this late urge and emerged on the winning side of a 5-2 count.

## Sunega And Varin Win Main Bouts Of Fight Card

### Two Technical Knockouts In Boxing Association's 3rd Session In Arena

Topping off an eight-bout card in the Timmins Arena Thursday, Aug. 8, Joe Sunega, 158 lb., formerly of the R.C.A.F., turned in his third win in as many starts by stopping Alex Chorney in one minute and fifty seconds of the fourth round.

Sunega, the aggressor, went after Chorney from the opening gong, boring in and swinging both fists in the general direction of his rival. Chorney, however, proved no easy target for Sunega's knockout punch. Weaving and jabbing, he caused Sunega to miss often.

Sunega, however, trapped his opponent on the ropes in the fourth round and smashed both fists to the body and head. Chorney's amazing ability to absorb punishment saved him from a K.O., but referee Art Leonard thought it best to call a halt and thus saved Chorney further punishment.

In the second main event of the evening both Cliff Varin and Young Dempsey started off their scheduled five-round encounter, slugging and

trying for a quick K.O.

The bout took on the aspect of being a very well-matched affair until the end of the second round when "Young" Dempsey, who sustained a sprained ankle while training preceding the bout, was forced to retire, thus giving the nod to Varin by a K.O. decision.

George Hamelin turned the tables on his conqueror of July 25 when he pounded out a clean-cut decision over R. Lavigne in the club's second card. But Hamelin, who trained very diligently for the return encounter, kept good his promise to do better by belting out a win for himself.

The first of the three bouts during the evening to be called by the referee was when Chris Joyce and Wolfe Blais tangled in the last of six preliminaries and wore themselves out fighting so furiously from the opening bell that Joyce was declared the victor at 1:12 of the second round because his adversary could not carry on.

In the fifth bout of the evening, Les Rickard staged a come-back in the second and final round of his bout with Gervais to gain the decision. Gervais started out strong in the first round but Rickard opening up in the second and third to win.

Roger "Chapple" Meunier scored his third win in as many shows when he captured the three-round decision over Bobby Larcker.

Rene Dorval gave a good account of himself when he managed a decision over 92-lb. Bobby Ritz. Wilfred Proulx came up with a hard-won victory over John Chartrand in the opening bout of the evening. Referees for the night were Art Leonard and Young Corbett, with Ernie Sasseville judging.

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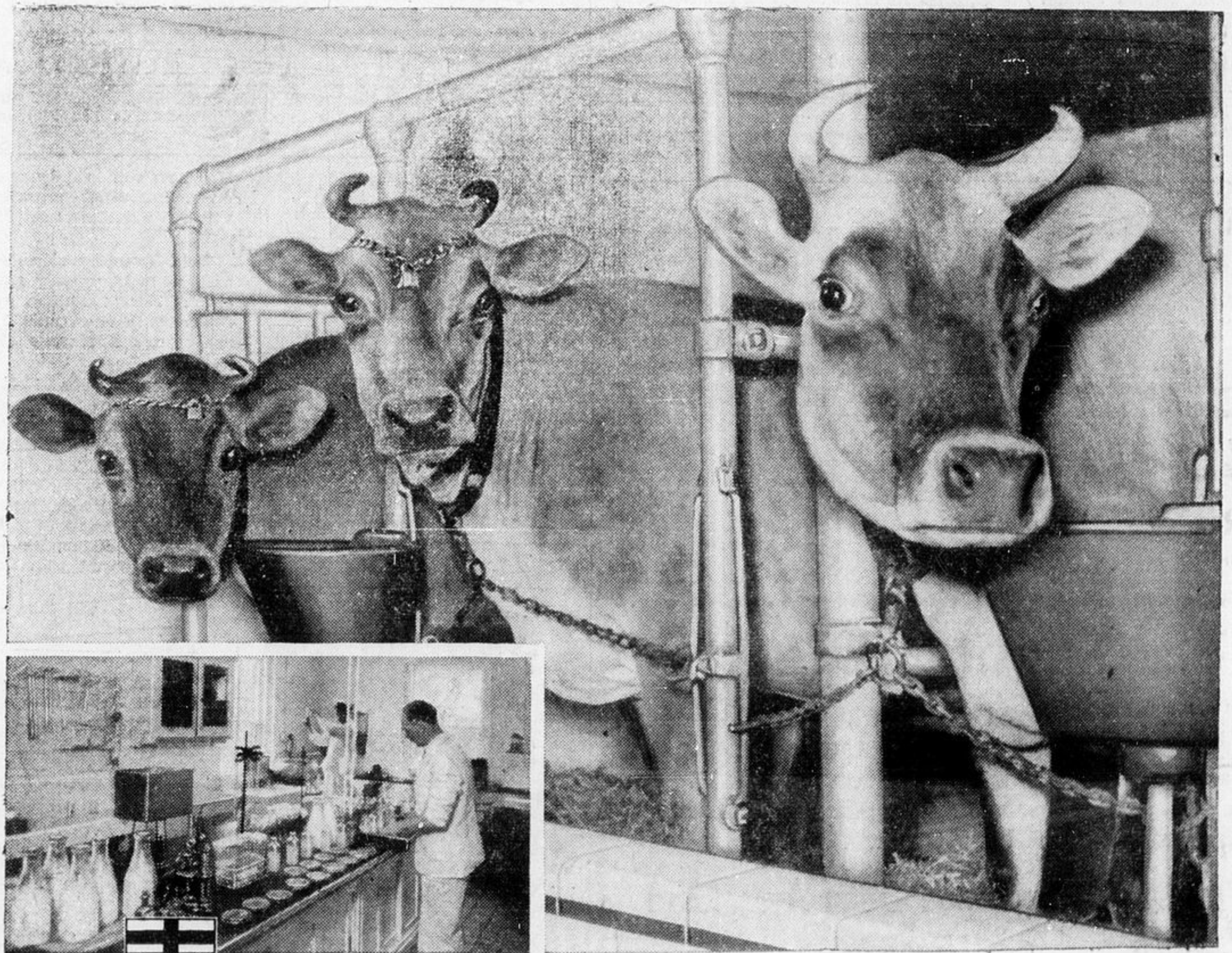

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**A CORNER ON CONES**

Nearly six billion pounds of milk are consumed or processed annually in Ontario; the yearly value of Ontario dairy products runs around \$140,000,000; Ontario butter and cheese production is about 200,000,000 pounds a year. The chief credit for these fat figures, which are about one-third of the totals for the entire Dominion, goes to Ontario's 1,200,000 milk cows — themselves a third of Canada's dairy herds. The Province's 8,000,000 gallons of ice cream, however, amount annually to 50% of the nation's "sundae-ness" — which may explain the noticeable cone-consciousness of young Ontarians.
