## Six Months Show Production Up In Gold, Over '45

Nearly Two Million Tons Of Ore Milled In Percupine In First Half Of 1946

Production of bullion by Ontario gold mines during the first six mouths of 1946 recorded a considerable increase over the comparable period of 1945. Figures released today by the Statistics Branch of the Ontario Department of Mines show that during the period under review, the gold mines milled 3,586,558 tons, which yielded 865 613 ounces gold, 143, 997 ounces of silver for a total value of \$33,414,893.

The percentage increases work out at 17.21 in tons milled, 13.32 in gold recovery, 9.78 in silver recovery and 13.49 in value over the figures for the first half of 1945.
