Course Planned For Nursing Assistants

Commencing Sept. 16, the provincial government offers a nine-month course for nursing assistants, and upon the completion of the course, which includes three months' instruction in a central school and six months' practice under supervision in selected hospitals, a certificate will be presented to the trainee qualifying her as a Certified Nursing Assistant.

To enroll in the course, a girl must have an interest in nursing, be in good health, have references, have Grade X education and be between the ages of 18 and 40.

There are many advantages to the course, one of them being the fact that there will be many opportunities in this field open after graduation. Trainees will also receive sixty dollars pay a month less cost of maintenance during their nine month course, and cost of transportation will be provided for Ontario residents from their place of residence to the Central School and from the Central School to the Hospitals where the practical training is given.

Application forms may be secured from the Superintendent of your local hospital, or from The Nurse Registration Branch, Department of Health, Province of Ontario, Toronto.

Six Months Show Production Up In Gold, Over '45

Nearly Two Million Tons Of Ore Milled In Porcupine In First Half Of 1946

Production of bullion by Ontario gold mines during the first six months of 1946 recorded a considerable increase over the comparable period of 1945. Figures released today by the Statistics Branch of the Ontario Department of Mines show that during the period under review, the gold mines milled 3,586,558 tons, which yielded 865,613 ounces gold, 143,997 ounces of silver for a total value of \$33,414,893.

The percentage increases work out at 17.21 in tons milled, 13.32 in gold recovery, 9.78 in silver recovery and 13.49 in value over the figures for the first half of 1945.

The second quarter of 1946 bettered the first by 3.23% in tons milled, 3.65% in gold output, 2.86% in silver recovery and 3.64% in value.

Forty mines reported production during June and grade of ore averaged \$9.67, the highest since May, 1945. June figures include 597,494 tons milled, 149,785 ounces of gold, 23,436 ounces of silver and an aggregate value of \$5,779,609. The increases over the same figures for June 1945 amount to 18.21% in tons milled, 23.57% in gold and 51.29% in silver recovery. Value of bullion sales was up by 23.63%.

Reports have been received from Hoyle Gold Mines Ltd. for the months of March, April, May and June. These show that ore has been forwarded to the Pamour mill for treatment but no sales have yet been recorded by the Royal Canadian Mint. Hoyle production, therefore, is not included in the above statistics.

Of the total of 3,586,558 tons milled in Ontario in the first six months of this year, 1,994,303 tons were milled in the Porcupine Camp, yielding 448,585 ounces of gold, 71,957 ounces of silver, for a value of \$17,325,659.

This compares with 1,782,145 tons milled in the first six months of 1945, for a value of \$16,010,368.

In the first six months of 1946, mines in the Kirkland Lake Larder-Lake belt milled 967,635 tons for a

THROUGH THE YEARS

TEN YEARS AGO
