### TEN YEARS AGO

"Progress of Mining Is Vital To Recovery," says Mines Minister," was the front-page heading in The Advance ten years ago. The story deals with a speech by Hon. T. A. Crerar, at the annual meeting of the Timmins Board of Trade. "The Porcupine Camp is making a very notable contribution to the prosperity of Canada," the speaker stated.

"Mr. Roosevelt did a kind thing for Canada when he raised the price of gold to \$35 an ounce," he continued.

Mayor J. P. Bartleman welcomed the speaker to Timmins and invited him to return for the town's 25th birthday in July of 1937.

**Czechoslovakian Wedding**  
Almost the entire Czechoslovakia colony of Timmins turned out to celebrate the marriage of Nellie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andy Valko, 157 Spruce St. North, to John Benedikty. The Finnish United church, where Rev. A. I. Heinonen performed the ceremony, was filled to overflowing.

**South Porcupine Wedding**  
A quiet wedding took place at St. Joachim's church on Saturday morning, when Miss Elsie Edna Kendall, Timmins, became the bride of Leo Alfred Gervais, of Golden City. She was attended by Miss Grace Wainwright.

**McIntyre Loses Ball Game**  
Wright Hargreaves ball players took home their first Temiskaming Baseball League Championship as they defeated McIntyre 11-7 in the fourth final in one of the craziest-looking games ever seen in the McIntyre park. The home team was beaten in the third inning when they made five miscues, letting in five Hargreaves runs off one hit.

**Gold Tournament**  
Low score in the first round of the Robinson handicap trophy, played at the Timmins Gold Club went to Miss Joy Wookey. The new trophy was presented by Mrs. H. S. Robinson of Schumacher. A C.L.G.U. competition was won by Mrs. York in the first flight, Miss Wookey in the second flight and Mrs. Leaman in the nine-hole flight.

**Mine Football**  
A football game between Hollinger and Dome for the first round of the Boxer Cup was played on the new grounds at Dome. Dome was on top of a 4-0 score at half-time, with the final result set at 5-2.

**Lacrosse**  
Timmins took the jump in the six-game series for the Wilson lacrosse trophy when they turned back South Porcupine 11-6 at the local arena.

### TWENTY YEARS AGO

Joseph A. Bradette got the Liberal nomination for the forthcoming federal election and J. Ray O'Neill was the Conservative candidate. Hon. Vincent Massey was scheduled to address a Liberal rally next Friday. A Conservative meeting tonight was

to be addressed by Hon. Chas. McCrea, Ontario's minister of mines.

**Special Funeral Service**  
A special funeral service to show honor and regard for the late Wm. Thomas, who was killed in the explosion underground at the Dome last week was held by the Welsh people of the town and district at Easton's Undertaking Parlors.

**Timmins Team Wins**  
By winning the baseball match at the Falls on Monday, Timmins clinched the championship of this group, and next week will play off with Silver Centre for the championship of the North Land. South Porcupine defaulted the game to be played with Timmins, thus making the way still easier.

**Movie Idol Dies**  
Rudolph Valentino, the screen star, died in New York after an operation for appendicitis. Thirteen years ago he came from Italy and at first worked as landscape gardener and at heavy work in an automobile factory.

**Finnish Picnic**  
The Finlanders of the town held an enjoyable picnic at Dalton's Park on Sunday. Races, athletics and sports were features of the day.

Rev. M. Hibbert, Grand Patriarch of the Grand Encampment, I.O.O.F. was a visitor to the Porcupine Camp, twenty years ago.

The town council decided to adopt a resolution by Councillors Brennan and Eplet instructing the Chief Constable to notify the Hollinger, McIntyre, Vipond and other mines or firms where men working were assessable to the municipality of Timmins to deduct five dollars from the next payroll on account of poll tax.

Council deferred action on the year-round Wednesday half holiday for stores here. Councillor E. L. Longmore, it was stated, was absent from council on holiday.

## TO THE EDITOR

Mr. Drew is to be commended on his prompt cancellation of the Progressive Conservative picnic in southwestern Ontario on the grounds of the impropriety of hotels, etc., contributing to such an event.

Mr. Drew explains the impropriety and gives his reason for this action by saying "hotels are subject to licensing, supervision and discipline by an agency of the Ontario government." It should be emphasized that such licences from the government are much sought after and considered a very valuable property to hotels, and those proposing to build them.

There is another type of organization that controls very valuable property at the pleasure of and which is subject to supervision and discipline by an agency of the Ontario government. I refer to the lumbering and pulp and paper companies who hold valuable limits and concessions of provincial forest land. Some of these companies have been large contributors to party funds, and this reason was given me recently by a prominent Progressive Conservative at the Lakehead as a reason why Mr. Drew has not proceeded with the Forest Resources Administration Commission which he promised.

If, as reported, Mr. Drew intends introducing legislation at the next session, prohibiting contributions to any political organization or for political purposes of any kind from hotels, etc., the same kind of legislation is in order applying similar restrictions to holders of timber limits and pulpwood concessions. If this were done perhaps the forest service would have a better chance of stamping out many of the abuses that have been prevalent for years, and still continue to the destruction of a great asset owned by the people. Certainly supervision and discipline by the Department of Lands

and Forests have been very slipshod in the past and frequently absent. Such legislation might help.
