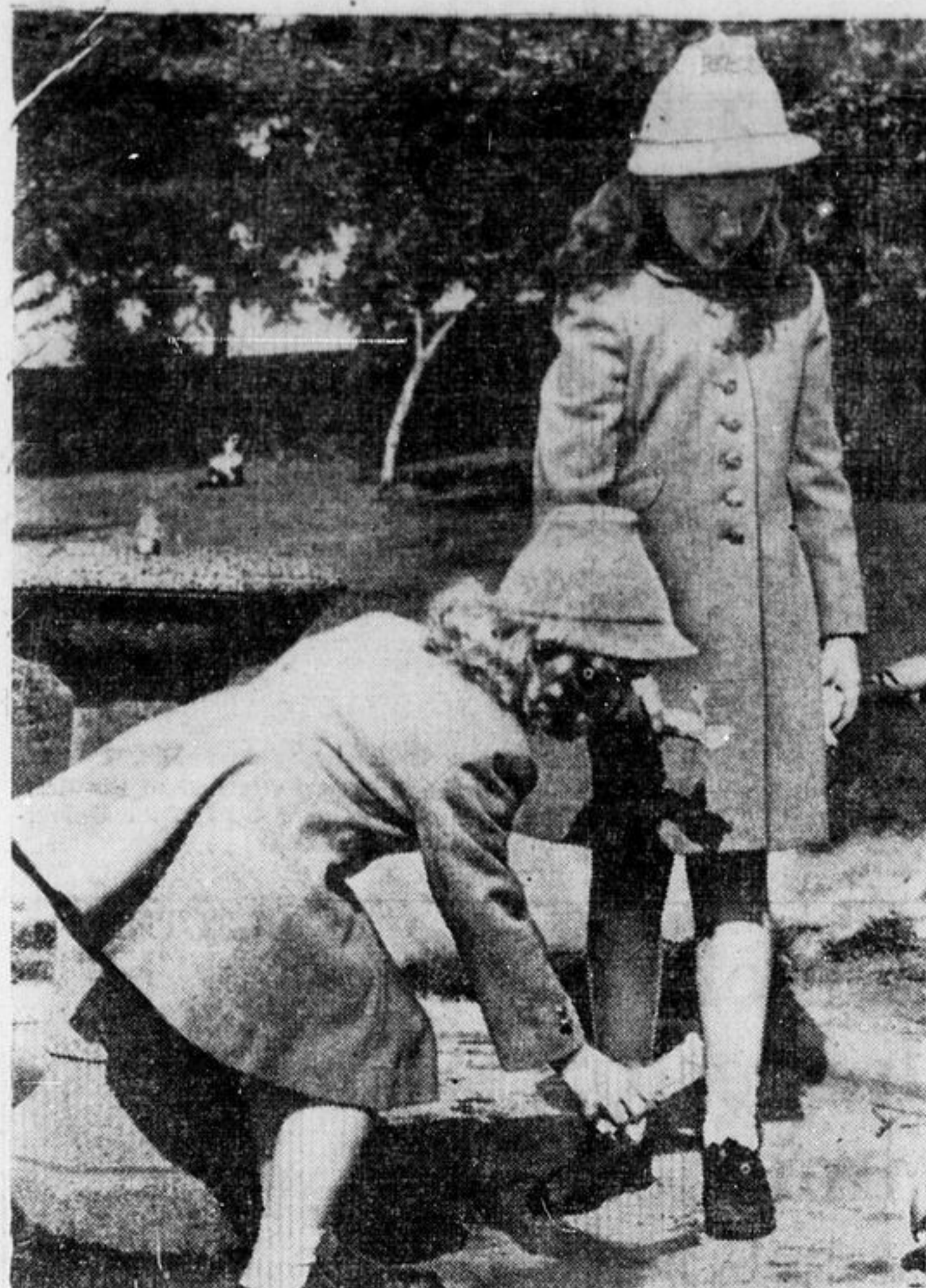
Later the couple left for a wedding trip to Montreal, Ottawa and other points and upon their return will reside in Schumacher.

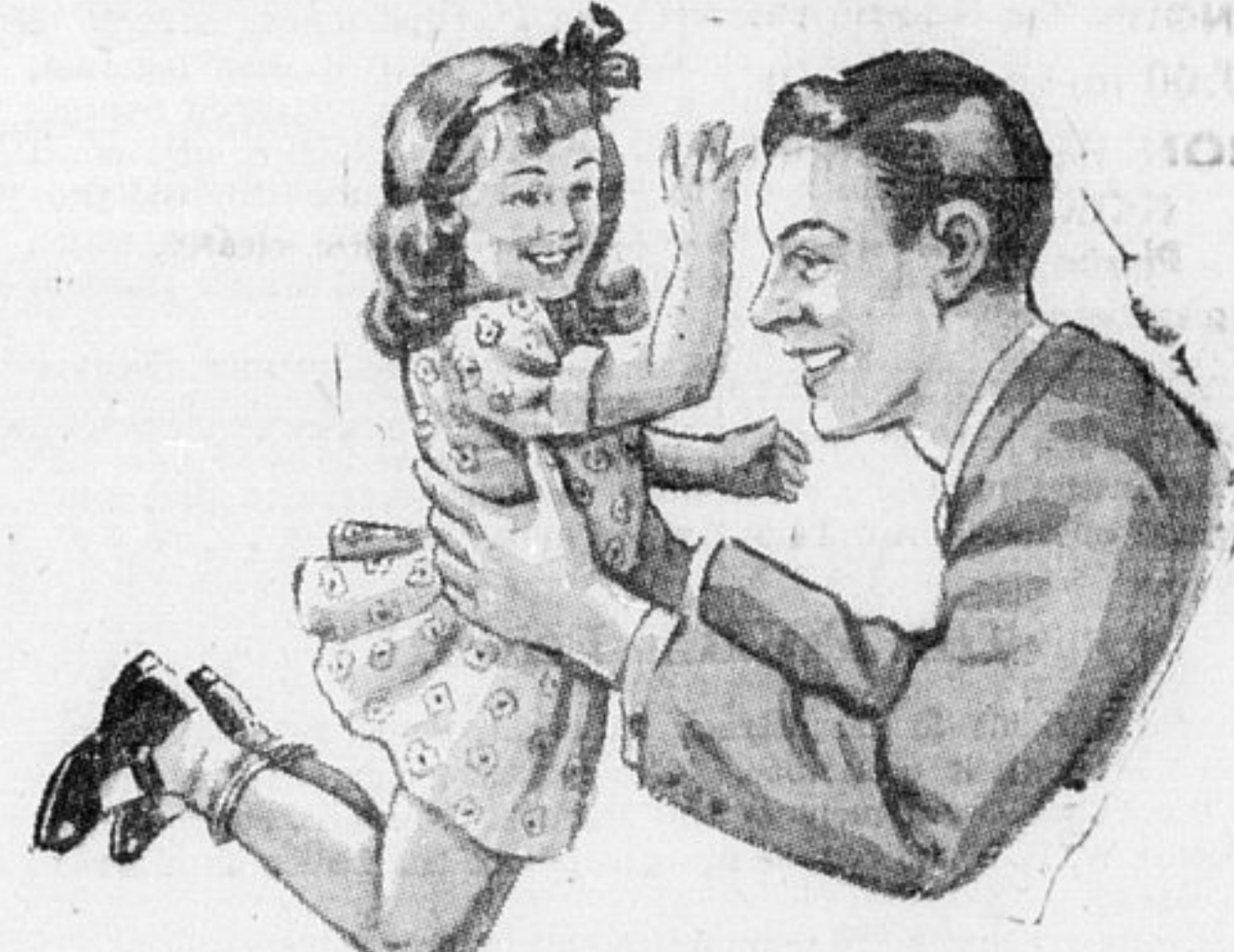
