FINNISH LADIES REVIEW PROGRESS

The Canadian Red Cross Unit of the Finnish United Church ladies held a business meeting Thursday evening, Sept. 26, at the home of Rev. A. I. Heinenon, 53 Rae St. South.

Mrs. Rachel Leivo, president of the Unit, was in the chair. Miss Leah Heinenon, secretary - treasurer, presented the final report on the finances of the unit. This was adopted by the meeting.

Since Sept. 27, 1939, when the unit was organized as a branch of the Ladies' Aid Sewing Circle of the Finnish United Church, the total receipts from offerings received at work meetings of the Unit to Sept 26 this year, were \$517.30.

From this amount the Unit had given donations to the following organizations: the Canadian Red Cross Society, the Ambulance Fund of the

Canadian Red Cross, the British Bomb Victims' Fund, the Salvation Army war work, the Canadian National Institute for Blind, the War Orphans of Britain, and, after the war, the War Orphans of Finland, and to other worthy causes.

During the war parcels were also sent regularly to local soldiers, sailors and airmen serving overseas.

The main part of the accomplishments of the ladies of this unit was the knitting of a great quantity of all kinds of articles required by the Canadian Red Cross for distribution to the armed forces of Canada serving overseas.

As the local branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society has discontinued its war time work, the Unit decided to discontinue also its work and disband, the ladies continuing, however, as the Ladies' Aid Sewing Circle to help in sending relief to the people of Europe in their great need. The election of officers was left to the next meeting to be held especially for that purpose.

After the business meeting refreshments were served by Miss Vera Heinenon, assisted by her sister, Miss Leah Heinenon. Rev. A. I. Heinenon conducted the devotional period.
