parents should also see to it that their children learn not to fall off docks.

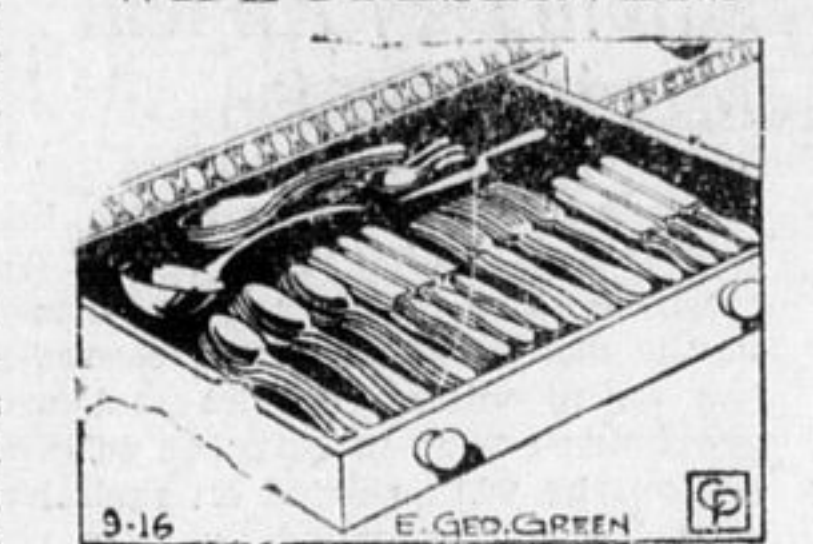
