WINNIPEG FLIER AWARDED VICTORIA CROSS



Posthumous award of the Victoria Cross to Pilot Officer A. C. (Andy) Mynarski, R.C.A.F., of Winnipeg, has been announced by R.C.A.F. headquarters in Ottawa. He died in an attempt to save the life of a fellow-crew member when their Lancaster bomber was shot down in flames over Cambrai, France, in June, 1944.



Flying Officer George Brophy, of Port Arthur, Ont., the rear-gunner of the Lancaster bomber, was killed in action on June 17, 1944. He was awarded the Victoria Cross for his gallantry in the air. He was the only member of the crew to survive the crash landing of the bomber.
