Kiwanians Discuss Interest In Scouts And Sea Cadets

The weekly luncheon of the Timmins Kiwanis on Monday at the Empire hotel was an "open forum," with committee reports and discussions featured. There was no guest speaker for the day, and for the first time in many months, there were no visitors.

President G. N. Ross was in the chair and during the meeting took occasion to refer to the fact that Kiwanian E. H. King was laid up with a broken ankle. All the club members wished him a speedy recovery.

Reporting for the Boy Scouts committee, Kiwanian Harry Wright noted that while the Boy Scouts were fully appreciative of the support and sponsorship of the Kiwanis, they would appreciate still more the personal interest of members in their affairs. He urged all to attend the Boy Scout event at the Sacred Heart Church hall on October 30th.

Kiwanian George Knowles emphasized this thought of personal interest by members of the club, and suggested that the event on October 30th would be a good time to start.

Kiwanian Knowles also reported for the committee making the survey for the Ontario Society for Crippled Children. The chairman of the committee, Kiwanian W. Rinn, said that soon there would be a call for volunteers to investigate the cases reported.

Kiwanian W. O. Langdon was appointed to represent the club at the next meeting of the local organization on Adult Education.

A specially interesting report was presented by Kiwanian Gordon Campbell on the Air Cadets, one of the most important of the activities sponsored by the Kiwanis. In the past five years the club had spent \$6,500 in this work. Last year the Government and the Air League had seemed to lessen their interest and effort, now both these bodies were active and interested. The committee wished to know the decision of the club as to the future sponsoring of the Air Cadets.

The success of the Air Cadets here owed much to the officers and instructors who had contributed their time and effort so generously. Kiwanian Campbell suggested that the club show its appreciation of the Commanding Officer, Lieut. P. T. Molesley, who was resigning effective the end of the year; his place to be taken by Lieut. W. Shields. Kiwanian Percy was given a great "hand" by the club.

Kiwanian P. T. Molesley told the club that the \$6,500 paid by the club for the Air Cadets was on a sliding scale, as it were, the cost in recent years being much less than in the first of the five years. Under present conditions, costs in the coming year would be still easier. Kiwanian Molesley reminded the club that they had a capital investment of \$3,170 in the Air Cadets, in uniforms and equipment, etc. Reference was made to the sports programme carried out in connection with the Air Cadets, basketball and hockey being featured. This year the Government had a fully detailed syllabus for the three years of Air Cadet training.

Kiwanian H. G. Laidlaw explained that the question of sponsoring Air Cadets had been discussed at the convention at St.-Andrew-by-the-Sea, and the clubs previously sponsoring Air Cadet Squadrons were agreed that they should continue to sponsor the movement at least for another year.

Others taking part in the discussion were Kiwanians Jack Beattie, W. Rinn, Barney Quinn, Earl Barkwell, G. A. Macdonald, W. O. Langdon.

Kiwanian Rinn suggested that the committee bring in a report on the matter, with their recommendation, and then the matter could be given definite discussion. This suggestion was accepted.

Community singing was led by Kiwanian Gordon Campbell, with Secretary W. H. Wilson at the piano.

What Is Magnuson Trying To Do?

HERE ARE THE ACTUAL FACTS, TAKEN BY DATE FROM THE CORRESPONDENCE FILES:

June 11 -- Local 2995 of Lumber and Saw Mill Workers Union applies to Regional War Labour Board for certification as bargaining agent for saw mill employees, NOT BUSHWORKERS.

June 20 -- Mountjoy Timber Company is notified of application by the Board. Had received no notice from Bruce Magnuson.

June 20 -- July 3 -- Copy of union application posted on Company bulletin boards, also a letter assuring employees that company would abide by decision of majority.

July 2 -- Company, not satisfied that union represented majority, wrote Magnuson suggesting vote of employees re union representation.

July 9 -- No answer from Magnuson; Company writes Magnuson again.

July 13 -- Magnuson answers, says he sees no reason to hold a vote.

July 30 -- Union and Company appear before Regional War Labour Board, who order more evidence.

Aug. 5 -- Company forwards evidence to Board.

Sept. 11 -- Board ordered union to contact Company re taking a vote, to ascertain wishes of majority.

Sept. 11 to Oct. 12 -- Company did not hear from Magnuson or any other union official.

Oct. 12 -- Magnuson calls strike of all employees, saw mill employees AND BUSHWORKERS.

Oct. 24 -- Company still operating. No communication from Magnuson to other union officials.
