Timmins Is Model For Film Board, Kiwanians Hear

Phil S. Shackleton and "Bud" Glantz, of the National Film Board staff at Ottawa, were the guest speakers at the weekly luncheon of the Timmins Kiwanis Club at the Empire hotel on Monday. Messrs. Shackleton and Glantz are in town at present taking "still" photographs to illustrate an article on the subject of juvenile delinquency.

In his address, Phil Shackleton explained that contrary to a popular misconception, they were not taking "motion pictures," but "still" photographs. These pictures, with brief explanatory articles were used by daily and weekly newspapers. Several other recent features by this department of the National Film Board had been published by Timmins newspapers. "We are using Timmins as a model town for preventing and off-setting juvenile delinquency," Mr. Shackleton told the Kiwanis, "because of the good work done by the Kiwanis and other service clubs, the schools, the churches, other societies and clubs in providing recreational facilities and otherwise striving to offset and prevent some of the factors that cause juvenile delinquency."

In his address, "Bud" Glantz made humorous reference to his residence in Timmins as a member of The Daily Press staff, and of his frequent visits here since then. He said that he had always considered Timmins as a very friendly town. "I always enjoyed leaving Timmins," he said, "because then I had the greater pleasure of looking forward to my next visit and the usual Timmins welcome." On a recent visit in connection with his work for the National Film Board, he had taken a picture of a prominent Timmins Kiwanian tee-ing off at the Timmins golf course. When the photo was developed, however, it showed Kiwanian Orville in a characteristic "baseball swing." This brought apt reply from other Kiwanians present.

In introducing the guest speakers, Kiwanian P. T. Moisey made reference to the fact that Phil Shackleton and "Bud" Glantz were doing effective work with the National Film Board. Phil had served as photographer with the Royal Canadian Artillery during the war. "Bud" was a native of Buffalo, and had been photographer for the Buffalo News, the Canadian Press and the Timmins Daily Press, before going with the National Film Board.

The thanks of the club for the two addresses were extended by Kiwanian F. A. Woodbury.

Kiwanian Rinn, chairman of the committee for crippled children, asked for volunteers to provide the use of cars to transport children to and from the clinic being held at Timmins next Monday and Tuesday for crippled children.
