Township of Tisdale PUBLIC NOTICE
Closing of Part of Lakeview Road, South Porcupine, Ontario, Extending South of the Easterly Production of the South Limit of Golden Avenue.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Tisdale proposes, after the 12th day of January, 1947, to pass a By-law stopping up and closing that portion of Lakeview Road as laid out on Registered Plan M-10 Sudbury, 48.06 feet wide and 200 feet long, extending southerly from the easterly production of the south limit of Golden Avenue in the Township of South Porcupine.

The proposed By-law further provides that the stopped up portion aforesaid be leased for the purpose of an airport hangar and site.

The proposed By-law and plans showing the land to be affected including a metes and bounds description thereof may be seen at the office of the Clerk-Treasurer of the Township of Tisdale at South Porcupine, Ontario.

The Council will hear in person or by his Counsel, Solicitor or Agent, any person who claims that his land will be prejudicially affected by the By-law and who applies to be heard.

NOTICE

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that it is the intention of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins to pass the following by-law after due notice thereof has been published in accordance with the Provisions of the Municipal Act.

BEING A BY-LAW to stop up certain streets and lanes within the Corporation.

TOWN OF TIMMINS BY-LAW NO.

WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation deems it desirable to close and stop certain streets and lanes within the Corporation.

AND WHEREAS notice of the intention of the Council has been duly advertised as required by the Municipal Act and all persons who claim that their land will be prejudicially affected by the By-law and who have applied to be heard, have been heard by the Council.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED as a By-Law of the Town of Timmins as follows:—

1. Those parts of the streets and lanes hereinafter described are hereby closed and stopped up:—

FIRSTLY:— Part of Lee Avenue as shown on Registered Plan M-63, Temiskaming; COMMENCING at the south west angle of Lot 88 as shown on said Plan; Thence east along the north boundary of Lee Avenue 122 feet 9 inches to the south east angle of Lot 88; Thence South 4 degrees 16 minutes west 33 feet 1 1/2 inches; Thence South 9 minutes East 33 feet to a point on the south boundary of Lee Avenue at the North east angle of Lot 145; Thence west along the south boundary of Lee Avenue 120 feet 5 inches to the intersection with the east boundary of Spruce Street; Thence North 9 minutes West along said east boundary 66 feet to the point of commencement; the said tract of land containing an area of 7986 square feet more or less.

SECONDLY:— Part of Lee Avenue as shown on Registered Plan M-63 Temiskaming; COMMENCING at the north west angle of lot 127 as shown on said plan; thence east along the south boundary of Spruce Street; Thence North 9 minutes West along said west boundary 51 feet; Thence west parallel with the south boundary of Lee Avenue 126 feet; Thence North 9 minutes west 15 feet to a point on the north boundary of Lee Avenue; Thence west along said north boundary 114 feet to the intersection with the east boundary of Pine Street; Thence south 9 minutes east along said east boundary 66 feet to the point of commencement; the said tract of land containing an area of 13905 square feet more or less.

THIRDLY:— Part of a lane as shown on Registered Plan M-63 Temiskaming; COMMENCING at the north west angle of Lot 144 as shown on said Plan; Thence south 9 minutes east along the west boundary of lots 144, 143 and 142 a distance of 105 feet; Thence west 12 feet to a point on the east boundary of Lot 129; Thence North 9 minutes west along the east boundary of Lots 129, 128 and 127 a distance of 105 feet to the south boundary of Lee Avenue; Thence East along said south boundary 12 feet to the point of commencement; the said tract of land containing an area of 1260 square feet more or less.

FOURTHLY:— All that part of Ogden Avenue as shown on Plan M-63, Temiskaming lying east of Spruce Street South and west of the Ontario Northland Transportation Commission right of way.

FIFTHLY:— That part of Ogden Avenue as shown on Plan M-63, Temiskaming lying east of the Ontario Northland Transportation Commission right of way and west of Railway Street.

SIXTHLY:— That part of First Avenue as shown on Plan M-33, Sudbury lying east of the projection northerly of the west boundary of Lot 22 according to Plan M-33, Sudbury and west of the Ontario Northland Transportation Commission right of way.

SEVENTHLY:— That part of the lane as shown on Plans M-30 Sudbury and M-5, Cochrane lying east of Lots 487 and 488 according to said Plan M-30, Sudbury and Lot 488 B according to Plan M-5, Cochrane between the projection easterly of the north boundary of said lot 487 and the projection easterly of the south boundary of said lot 488 B.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that any person who claims that their land will be prejudicially affected by the By-Law and who applies to be heard, will be heard by the Council, in person or by his Counsel, Solicitor or Agent at a time to be fixed therefor upon the application to be heard.

NOTICE

Township of Tisdale Proposed By-Law No. 681.

Being a By-Law To Provide For Raising The Sum Of Three Hundred And Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000.00) By Way Of Loan On The Security Of Debentures Of The Municipal Corporation Of The Township Of Tisdale For The High School Board Of The Township Of Tisdale Pursuant To The Provisions Of The High Schools Act And The Municipal Act.

TAKE NOTICE that pursuant to the requirement of the Ontario Municipal Board the above styled proposed By-Law No. 681 of the Township of Tisdale will be submitted to the electors (persons qualified to vote on a money by-law) and the votes taken at the same time and at the same places as the 1946 annual municipal election for the Township of Tisdale.

The following is a true and correct synopsis of proposed By-Law No. 681.

(a) The purpose of the By-Law is to borrow on the credit of the Corporation at large the sum of Three Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000.00) for building, equipping and furnishing a High School at South Porcupine in the Township of Tisdale and completing the grounds in connection therewith.

(b) The debentures shall all bear the same date and shall be issued within one year after the passing of the proposed By-law and shall be payable in fifteen (15) equal annual instalments.

(c) The amount to be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the Township of Tisdale for the payment of the said debt and interest will be \$28,268.26.

(d) The debentures shall be redeemable at the option of the Corporation in whole or in part on any interest payment date prior to maturity.

AND TAKE NOTICE that the 9th day of December, A. D. 1946, at 8 o'clock in the afternoon at the council chambers in the said municipality has been fixed for the appointment of persons to attend at the polling places and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk.

AND TAKE NOTICE that if the assent of the electors is obtained to the said proposed By-law it will be taken into consideration by the municipal Council of the said Corporation after the expiration of one month from the date of the first publication of this notice and that such first publication was made on the 16th day of November, A. D. 1946.

AND TAKE NOTICE FURTHER that a tenant who desires to vote upon the said proposed By-law must deliver to the Clerk not later than the tenth day before the day appointed for taking the vote, a Declaration under The Canada Evidence Act, that he is a tenant whose lease extends for the time for which the debt or liability is to be created, or in which the money to be raised by the proposed By-law is payable, or for at least twenty-one (21) years, and that he has by the lease covenanted to pay all municipal taxes in respect of the property of which he is a tenant other than local improvement rates.

Acting Mayor
Councillor Len Cousins presided in the Mayor's chair in the absence of Mayor Bartleman who was in Cochrane this week in connection with cases at the non-jury civil sessions of the High Court.

King Abdicates
At one o'clock today Prime Minister King spoke over the CEC network, saying that official word had been received from the British government and had passed an order in council under the terms of the statute of Westminster in which Canada agrees with the United Kingdom in accepting the abdication of King Edward and the ascension of the Duke of York.

Explosives High
An article in the Dec. 6th, 1916, Advance, pointed out that Dome Mines operating costs had greatly increased owing to the high price of explosives.

Pay Taxes or Lose Vote
A by-law passed by town council made it compulsory for all to pay their taxes by December 14, or lose the right to vote at the municipal election immediately following.

Land Worth \$35.00 Per Acre
The Ontario Railway and Municipal Board upheld Judge Hartman's decision in the appeal against the tax on the Foley-O'Brien mining lands in Tisdale township. "The effect of the judgment," said the Advance, "is that all mining claims in the north land shall be assessed as farm lands, and that the Board considers such farm lands worth \$35.00 per acre."

Operating costs were given at \$2.88 per ton.
