POACHED EGGS

Break eggs into boiling salted water in a shallow pan. Have the water deep enough to come over top of the eggs. Remove the pan from the heat as soon as the water commences to simmer again. Cover, and let stand for about 5 mins., or until the eggs are as firm as you want them.

Remove the eggs carefully and serve on toast. Pour a little melted fat over them. Add salt and pepper to taste. Poached eggs are also good served on a bed of flaky, cooked rice, or spinach or other greens.

Note: A zinc jar top placed in the pan of water will shape the egg into a circle.

SPANISH TOAST

2 eggs, beaten slightly, 1/4 cup tomato juice, 1 tsp. sugar (optional), 1/4 tsp. salt, pepper, 5-6 slices bread, 3 tbsps. fat, onion juice.

Blend beaten eggs, tomato juice, sugar and seasonings. Dip both sides of each slice of bread into the mixture. Brown on both sides in hot fat in frying pan.

BUDGET OMELETTE

1 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 cup milk, 4 eggs, separated, salt and pepper to taste.

Mix milk and crumbs, let the crumbs soak, then beat smooth. Beat yolks, add to bread mixture. Beat whites stiff and fold into mixture. Pour into hot greased pan and cook slowly until firm 25-30 mins. Cook in the oven for the last 10 mins. to brown on top. This four egg omelette will serve 4-5 people. The same mixtures may be cooked as scrambled eggs.

SCRAMBLED EGGS WITH CHEESE FOR 8

8 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 3 tbsps. butter, salt and pepper to taste, 1/2 cup cheese.

Beat eggs slightly and combine with milk and seasoning. Melt fat in top part of double boiler or in frying pan. Add egg mixture and cook very slowly, stirring constantly, until mixture begins to thicken. Add cheese. Cook 1 minute longer.

RENNET-MILK METHOD

1/2 pound butter, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1 cup top milk, 1/2 rennet tablet, 1/2 tsp. cold water.

Let butter stand in a warm place until soft, but not melted.

Add salt to milk and heat slowly, stirring constantly, until it is warm, but not hot; remove at once from heat.

Dissolve rennet tablet in cold water and add to the lukewarm milk; stir for a few seconds only. Let stand in saucepan until firm—about 10 mins. Do not chill.

Add set rennet-milk mixture to softened butter; beat with rotary beater until perfectly blended. Chill. Suggestions for sandwich fillings: Mince dates and grated carrots, cot-

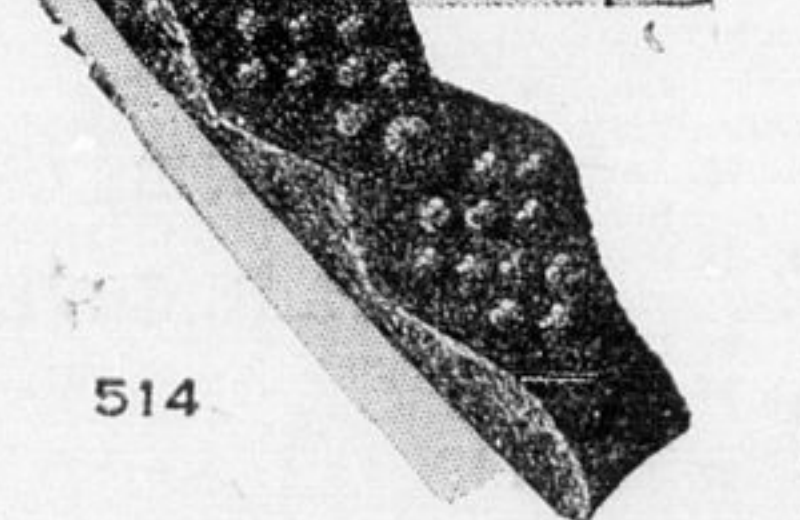
JOLLY BEFORE DANCE PARTY AT McNEILS
