Signs carried by six picketers asked Timmins people not to shop Wednesday afternoon at the three places because of the Wednesday afternoon closing by-law now being contested in the Supreme Court of Ontario.

First Dividend of Vipond
 Vipond Consolidated Mines, Limited, will pay its first dividend April 15, to all shareholders on record April 1. The dividend is for a disbursement of 3 per cent. The workings of the mine have now reached a depth of 1,200 ft and ore reserves last July 31 were estimated at 32,475,000 tons. The acquisition of the Porcupine Crown and Thompson-Krist adds to the company's potentialities. In December, 3,265 tons of ore were milled and bullion to the value of \$56,300 was shipped. Average recovery \$6.86 per ton.

Rouyn Asks To Be Town
 The village of Rouyn, Quebec, is asking by private bill in the Quebec Legislature this session that the camp be given the status of a regular town.

Timmins Curlers Make Good Showing
 Timmins curlers won the first curling competition at the big bonspiel in Halleybury which ends Saturday. The competition was for the McKellar Cup, presented by the Sault Ste. Marie Curling Club, and is held by the winning rink for one year. The Timmins rink winning the cup is skipped by W. McCracken, with John Watt as vice, R. H. Hall as second and Geo. Lake as lead. In addition to the McKellar Cup there are four individual prizes of mahogany metal clocks.

Prospecting Rush at Kamiskotia
 The latest report in regard to the Kamiskotia copper-gold field is that United States financial and mining interests have entered the field and have secured several options representing considerable money outlays during the coming year or so. The presence of T. & N. O. surveyors in the district mapping out a line from Timmins to the new field naturally had a noteworthy effect.

Hollinger Stock Makes New Record
 The Hollinger, Canada's premier gold mine, came into its own yesterday as leader of a general upward revisioning of prices on the mining board. From a previous close of \$20.50 the stock advanced to a new high for all time at \$22.75, being a gain of \$2.25 on the day and \$1.75 over the previous high level established some weeks ago.

Petition For New Post Office
 A petition is being circulated in Timmins this week asking for a new post office for this town. Mr. S. A. Bourtin started the petition on its rounds, and it is being largely signed.
Miners Shoots Wife and Self
 The postmortem held on Monday on the bodies of Mike Kulick and his wife showed that only one shot had taken effect on the woman, though Kulick had shot at her several times in the Ukrainian hall at South Porcupine last Friday. Kulick had two bullets in his head. He turned the gun on himself after he had shot his wife. The first bullet grazed his head. Four hours later, surrounded by police, he fired a second shot that pierced his

brain. The tragedy shocked South Porcupine, where Mrs. Kulick was highly respected.

Hollinger Employee Dies
 Mr. Eugene Chartier passed away at the Hollinger hospital from injuries received at the Hollinger last week when a cement bucket snapped its cable and hit him on the head. He leaves a widow and ten children.

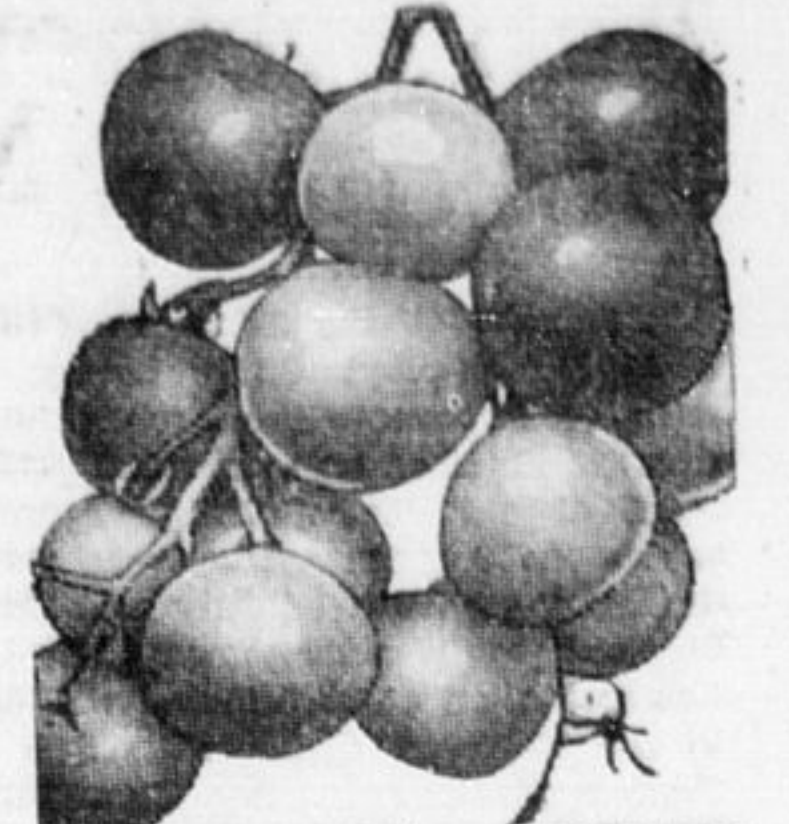
South Porcupine Patriotic Society
