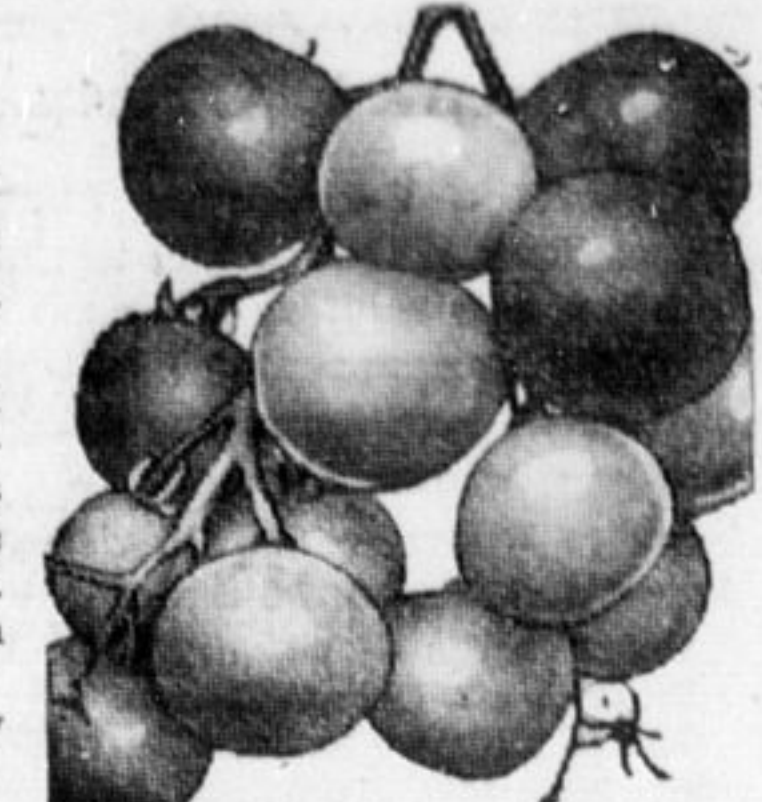
**THIRTY YEARS AGO**

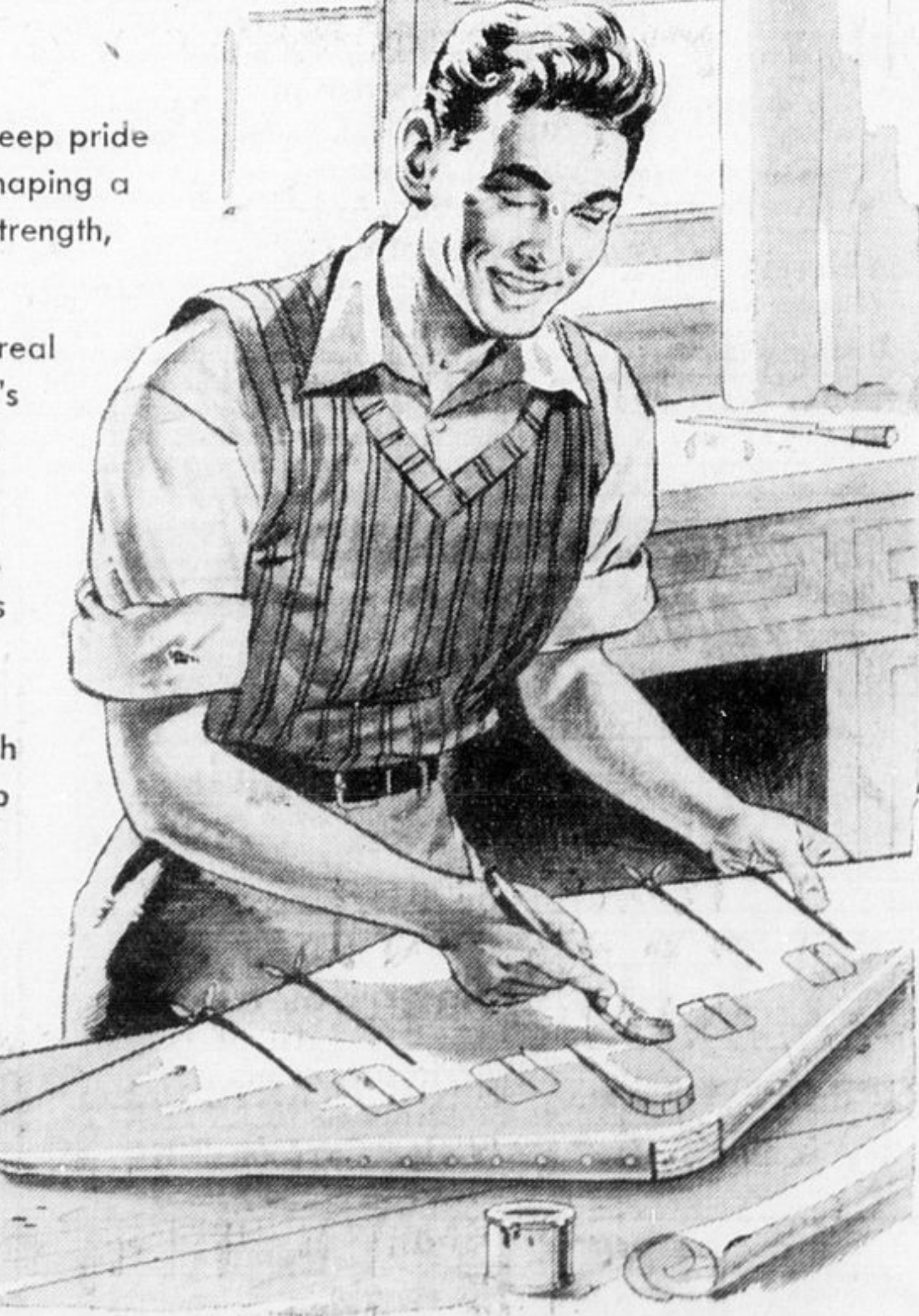
