Annual Day of Prayer

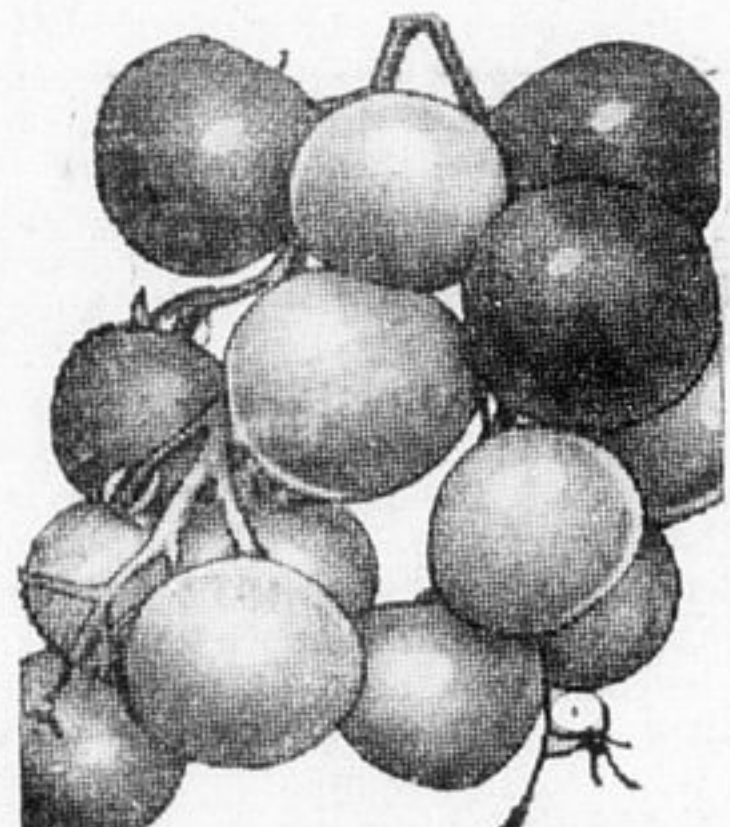
Trinity United Church was filled to capacity Friday afternoon for the annual Day of Prayer. Ladies from the churches in Timmins and district attended.
