In later year they have spent their time teaching at Ayr, Dundee, Aberdeen, Liverpool and London. Before leaving England for Canada thy were regarded as the leading dance authorities in Scotland. While attending the British Championships they met Madge Austin, former professional at the Porcupine Skating Club and she finally persuaded them to come over and take the position she held here and later relinquished to become Mrs. Saunders. Madge who had made the local club "figure skating conscious" and who produced all the local champions believed Eric and Vera Batchelor the only people capable of taking over. Finally being persuaded by Madge, they experienced a little difficulty in getting away, owing to the fact they were much in demand by the Dundee management. However Miss Austin (she will always be that to the people she knew over her) won, and this indeed was our gain, for these instructor who are the holders of N.S.A. Instructor's Certificates and highest honors and many medals in the realm of figure skating, show interest in the smallest child beginner to the most advanced skater and this, is surely something worth having especially when a club can boast of a 400 membership.

• * * * • Mr. and Mrs. Batchelor are in charge of the technical management of the Summer School of Skating and later plan to make a tour of the United States. While on tour they will give Gold Dance Exhibitions.

Mr. and Mrs. Batchelor have one daughter Erica, another skating visitor to the Porcupine. Erica flew over from England with her parents and was very much thrilled to fly the Atlantic. Was all agog with New York and loves the Porcupine Camp. This young lady has a record that one can be proud of having become a Gold Figure and Silver dance medalist at the early age of 11. Erica was the youngest skater in Britain to attain such an honor. She also earned the distinction of being the youngest competitor in the Junior Championships last year on 20 minutes a day practise. Coming to Canada she sacrificed her chances of winning the Championship this year. But Erica is happy, to be with her parents and to attend school with the friends she has made since coming here last Fall. Her parents deciding to let education come first and are content with her passing the tests here on time allotted for skating practise, though it is barely enough to hold ones position, while attending school sessions. Despite this privation Erica, who is not only an excellent skater but a fine singer is happy in her new environment.

A new side of the brilliant career of Barbara Ann Scott, World's Figure Skating Champion, has just-been brought to public notice during the last few days. Not only is Barbara Ann a marvel on ice, not only has she won the offection of everybody because of her skill and grace and her winning smile, but she has earned the respect of aviation men for her oustanding ability as a solo flier. With many hours to her credit, mostly in the sky over Ottawa she is, in the word of an official in the Department of Civil Aviation, a "perfectionist". He went on to describe her as one of the most promising young people he had ever seen handling a plane, in fact, one of the finest natural fliers in Canada.

Th crew of the Trans-Canada Air Lines plane which brought her from Ottawa to Montreal recently were proud to welcome such a distinguished fellow pilot into the cockpit/When, on arrival at the airport, they had more time to explain the system of controls to her, they were not surprised at her quick understanding of the big aircraft, They were Captain J. Barbara Ann was received wholeheartedly by the aviation world when she was met at the Montreal Airport by Rt. Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister in charge of Civil Aviation, and H. J. Symington, C.M.G., K.C., president og Trans-Canada Air Lines. Mr. Symington pinned a pair of wigs on her coat and handed her a document commissioning her a "Honorary Flight Captain, Trans-Canada Skyliners."

Another honor bestowed upon her was a membership in the Short-Shorters Ocean Flying Club. On her way to Europe in January to bring glory to herself and Canada, Barbara Ann flew across the Atlantic from Montreal, thereby becoming eligible. She was initiated, recently, when she autographed the traditional dollar bill belonging to Shrot Snorter F. M. McGregor, operations manager of T.C.A. trans-Atantic service, and he signed her bill, to which was pinned two Swiss five-franc notes, a Swedish ten-kroner note and other currency. In addition to Captain McGregor's signature Barbara Ann's dollar will bear the autographs of Mr. Howe, Mr. Symington and the T.C.A. flight crew who toko her across on that memorable trip these are - Captain J. R. Bowker, First Officer B. G. Hughes, Navigating Officer D. C. Willis, Radio Officer B. H. Bevan and Purser-Steward B. W. Foggo.
