It Cost Town \$197.44 Water Rate Dispute

With councillor Leo Delvillano voting against it, council voted to pay a bill of \$197.44 to Gore and Storey for professional evidence given in the investigation Dec. 9, 1947, of the water rate the town of Timmins pays the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines.

The special investigator was sent up at the request of the district judge whom the town had asked to make the investigation.

Councillor Bartleman said the whole investigation was a waste of money, that Timmins has one of the cheapest water rates in Canada. It is slightly over three cents per thousand gallons. "Sure it was a waste of money," agreed Mayor Brunette, "but a political football was being made of it and it had to be settled by an impartial judge. We had no other course."

Individual Permit For Each Plumbing Fixture May Be Introduced.

Presenting the case for an amended plumbing by-law whereby householders would be able to secure a separate permit for each fixture installed, town engineer McLean said that this would be of assistance to the town assessor, and would help keep public work records straight.

Under the proposed amendment the home owner would pay 50 cents for a permit for the first fixture and 25 cents for each additional fixture installed.

However, it was believed that with the shortage of fixtures nearly over this difficulty would not be encountered in the future.

Leo J. Boissonneault was fined \$20.00 and costs for assaulting the manager of the Golden Arrow Restaurant on April 2nd.

The manager, who appeared in court as witness, said Boissonneault and another man were disturbing other customers by their noise, and when he asked them to quiet down the accused had attacked him.

Commenting on the provincial Municipal Board's refusal to real a zoning by-law as requested by council, Mr. Bartleman suggested sending them a resolution for refusing to repeal a by-law which the Board themselves sanctioned.

Mayor Brunette, however, was in favor of advertising and finding out what the townspeople would like, stating that the Board would send representatives to investigate zoning in Timmins if requested.

"It seems ridiculous to have them up at present," councillor Roberts, said, "until we complete our town planning and zoning. The minor change we contemplate is hardly worth bothering about."

You two men attacked George McLeod, giving him serious injuries, and then robbed him of \$25.00. However, as it has been proved that both of you had been drinking I will sentence you each to one year hard labor. Penalty for overloading is a fine or imprisonment, or both. Permits may also be suspended.
