The meeting opened with O Canada followed by a sing song led by Mr. Lillie with Miss Gertrude Bristow at the piano.

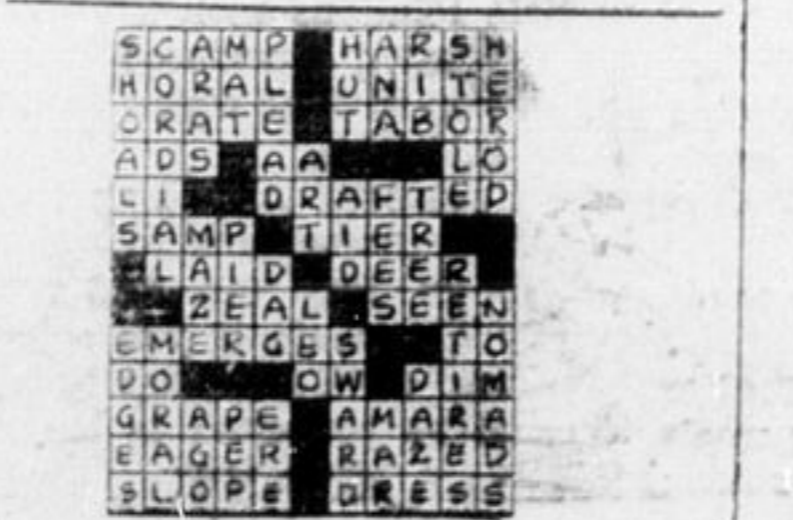
