

Compensation Board Symposium Attended By Many Local Doctors

Doctors from all over this area of Northern Ontario attended the gathering of the Ontario Workmen's Compensation Board held at St. Mary's Hospital on Saturday afternoon.

Dr. J. D. Galbraith, vice-chairman of the Board in a brief address told those present "The position of the Ontario workman in respect to compensation benefits is the envy of all labor unions on this continent". He also stated that the injured workmen in Ontario get better care, better medical provision and greater compensation than anywhere else in the world. He said the policy of the Board was to provide the best care the province could afford.

Dr. M. Steele, chief officer of the Board, in his address described several types of fractures, methods of examination and pointed out the need for physiotherapy and mental training.

M. R. Campbell, head of the Board's rehabilitation branch and physical therapy division, pointed out that the Board was establishing a new centre where men could be under observation for 24 hours.

C. G. Cameron, medical aid officer with the Board, stated that over eleven hundred accounts pass through their office every day. He stated that full medical attention started in 1919 in Ontario and pointed out that one case on record had cost the Board \$70,000.

The Liberal Association convention, which will feature the election of a provincial party leader and the endorsement of a new party platform will be the first full-fledged one to be held since 1943.

Considerable interest has already been displayed regarding the choice of a new leader. To date, Farquhar Oliver, M.P.P. for Grey South, is the only candidate to announce publicly that he will stand for election. Mr. Oliver has been leader of the Liberal Opposition in the Ontario Legislature since his appointment in 1945.

Liberal members in the House endorsed his candidature for party leadership at a caucus held at Queen's Park on April 3, the closing day of the last session.

Members of the association management committee will meet in Toronto on May 14, the day prior to the annual meeting. Voting on the new leader will take place May 16. Guest speaker at the convention dinner will be Hon. Lionel Chevrier, K.C., M.P., minister of transport.

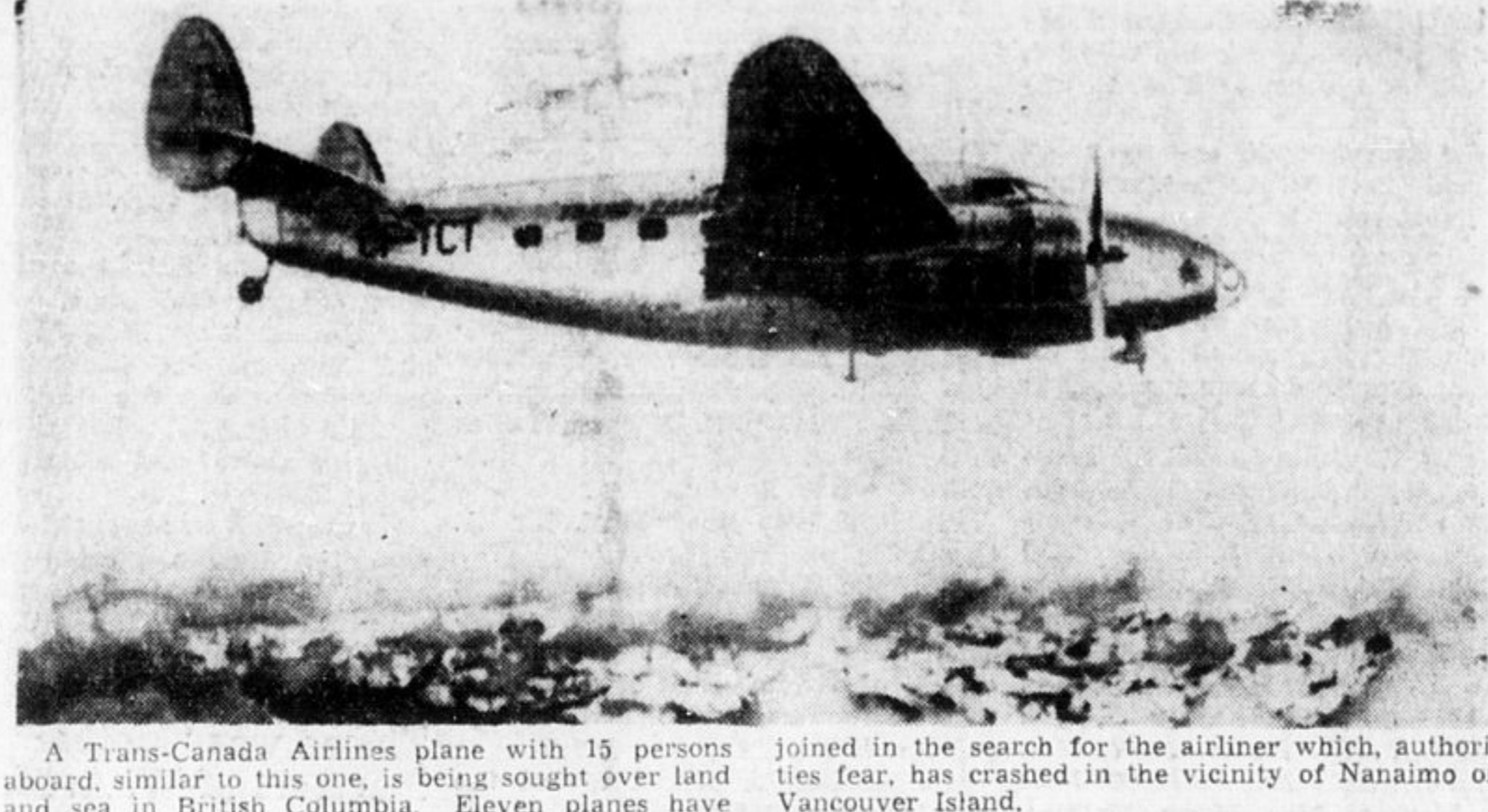
The sacrament of baptism was administered to eight children by the Rev. Gilmour Smith, minister of the church.

Rev. Dr. R. S. Seeley, Provost of Trinity College, Toronto, in his sermon at the service held in St. Matthew's Church which opened the 14th Synod of the Diocese of Moosonee told the congregation that "there is an issue to be faced in our generation which can be sharply defined, and unless the Christian Church triumphs in this issue it will become a small and insignificant force in society for many years to come".

The Provost of Trinity spoke of the growth of humanism as this issue and said the achievements of man "has led people to ask if anything lies beyond man's achievements". Every time progress was made they came up against the imponderable fact of human nature. Over against the attitude based on humanism stands the Christian Church and the Christian faith "which starts with human nature and from human nature works toward society," said the noted Provost.

In opening his sermon, Dr. Seeley said a meeting of Synod was a very solemn occasion where decisions are sought under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and where delegates seek the fellowship and inspiration of the Holy Spirit in their deliberations. He also spoke of the new and vast era which had marked the history of the world from the dawn of moral responsibility for man through the Reformation to the present day.

Dr. Seeley was welcomed by His Grace Rt. Rev. R. J. Renison, Bishop of Moosonee.

Clergy and lay delegates to the Synod marched in the procession into the church, where Rev. A. R. Chidwick conducted the first part of the service. The first lesson was read by the Rev. Neville Clarke, of Nakina, who is in charge of the Ojibway Indian missions, and the second lesson by Rev. Major A. C. McCallum, of Ironquois Falls. Rev. John Ford, of Cochrane and until recently of South Porcupine read prayers and Bishop Renison pronounced the Benediction.

Business sessions have been in progress at McIntyre Community Building and yesterday morning the Bishop delivered his charge. Provost Seeley was guest speaker at the Synod luncheon held yesterday.
