Porcupine, the retiring president, and Mrs. Fairhurst also of South Porcupine retiring treasurer, and a Diocesan Life Membership to Mrs. A. H. Cooke, Schumacher as a mark of recognition for long and valued service.

Some 40 delegates and a number of branch presidents, visitors and life members registered.

In the afternoon session Bishop Renison addressed the meeting on "A dream coming true of uniting the parishes of Moosonee". There are eight self-supporting parishes and the Bishop expects the number to be 10 or 12 within the next four years. He said "where you pitch your tent there build your altar, the foundation of all essentials". After the Bishop's talk several of the branches read their reports.

A reception was held on Wednesday evening in the Curling Club House, approximately 175 people attending. On Thursday a luncheon for delegates and friends was tendered by the Kirkland Lake branch, guest speaker being Miss Evelyn Mills, O.B.E.

**Italy's Crisis The News, Briefly:**

ITALY'S REPUBLIC IS A "government without the Left", for the first time in its 12 months of postwar existence.

COMMUNISTS WERE EXCLUDED by Premier Alcide de Gasperi after nearly three weeks of vain attempt to obtain broad political agreement.

CHRISTIAN DEMOCRATS on which Signor de Gasperi depends have 207 of the Constituent Assembly's 556 seats. Communists hold 104 seats and the Socialists 115, making a Leftist bloc of 219. This leaves the Independents with a significant balance of power.

MAJOR PORTFOLIOS in the new Cabinet — the fourth to be headed by Signor de Gasperi — include: Foreign Minister, Carlo Sforza; Defense, Mario Cingolani; Finance, Giuseppe Pella; Interior, Mario Scelba; Justice, Giuseppe Grazi.

American Officials, meanwhile, are considering the problems of turning Italy over to the Italians. The Italian Treaty has been drafted but not yet signed. It provides for withdrawal of troops within 90 days after ratification. There are 20,000 American soldiers in Italy.

CONTINUED AMERICAN OCCUPATION, at least in police form, was read into reports that long term military accommodations were being provided at Livorno. The Associated Press said the school for children of American military personnel there would be re-opened. The American railway office at Livorno has received a new marble facing. Requisitions have been made for military rest camps along the Livorno coast.
