Dear Sir:
 The Northern Miner of June 19, 1947 quotes you with making some very foolish and untrue statements and upon investigation of the matter we find that you are to be credited with this mis-statement of facts.

You, as a member of the Legislature representing the constituency of Cochrane South, of which the Porcupine Camp is a part, should investigate these remarks before contacting the Press. These same people whom you say are not in the union are very much put out by your remarks and have ordered me as President of Local 241, I.U.M.M. & S.W., to protest your action in no uncertain terms. The story you had published about a group of miners' wives crashing a union strategy meeting is a pure fabrication. Or maybe there is an element of wishful thinking on your part in the matter.

Mr. Bradette, you mustn't forget that the workers, not the mine operators, control the bulk of the votes in your district and you, aligning yourself with these mine operators against the working people, quite clearly point out as to whom you actually do represent. You apparently think that our Union is controlled by a political faction. I herewith invite you, as a representative of the people, to attend one of our membership meetings and I know that you, who apparently does not understand trade unions, will be amazed at the show of democracy by the workers at these gatherings. These meetings are held every Wednesday evening at 7.30 p.m. in the Union Hall, 177 Algonquin Blvd., E., in Timmins and we shall be looking forward to seeing you attend one of these meetings in the very near future.

You also condemn a forty-hour week and have said the workers must take work elsewhere to live. Surely you, as a Member of Parliament, know that this is not a fact and that there are people working in the mines for forty-eight hours a week who find it necessary to work elsewhere to make ends meet. This is the reason our Union is asking for increased wages and you Sir, if you had the welfare of the majority of the people in your constituency at heart would make it your business to see that this wage increase was put into effect.

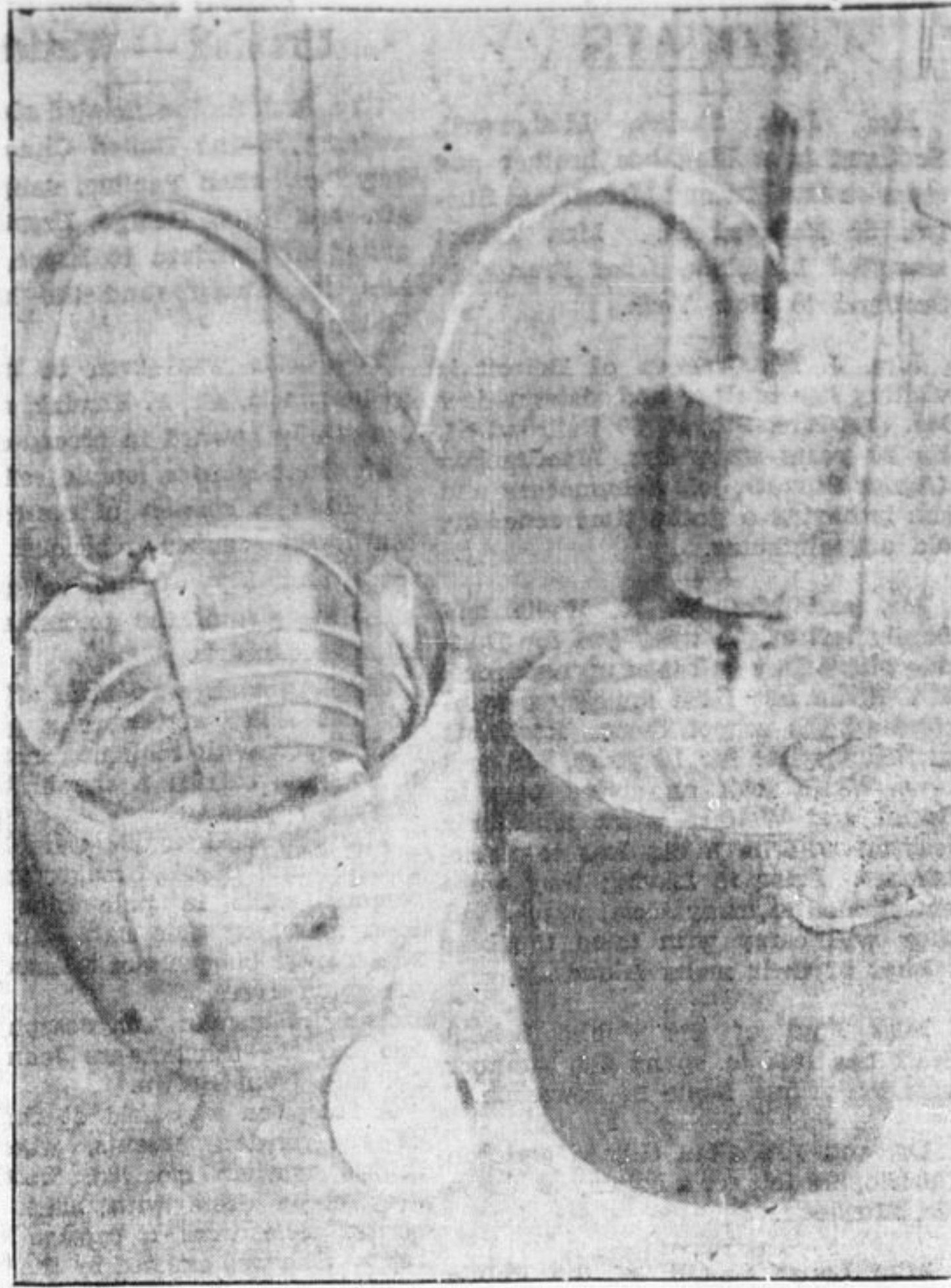
As far as the "Communist Bogie" is concerned we are not surprised or perturbed by the fact that you brought this into your interview. It is a stock argument used by all people who are opposed to trade unions and we must assume, after reading this erroneous statement, that you are in this category. The Union is just what its membership is composed of. We have people that believe in different political parties and we may even have people that believe in you as a politician. That is their business, that is democracy, and should you accept our invitation you will see probably a greater show of democracy in the trade union than you ever thought possible.

DENTAL X-RAYS

The value of X-ray examination of teeth is noted by national health authorities. X-rays enable the dentist to find concealed dental cavities while they are still small and are not readily discoverable by other means, thus making possible early treatment.

X-ray may uncover such things as infections around tooth-roots, edged or impacted teeth, and injury to bone, due to a tooth striking too hard. Examination by its aid may also disclose bone changes leading to pyorrhea and conditions in children tending to develop irregular teeth, tumors or cysts.

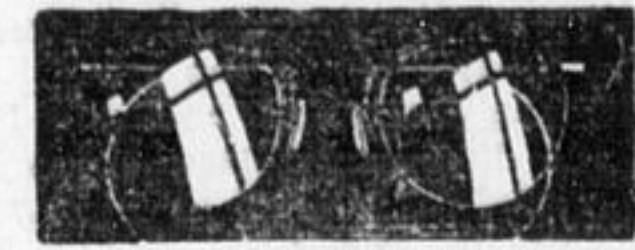
Look For The Jeep Parade on Saturday
