Knowledge of French Lacking Police Lose Sale of Beer Charge

When Constables Guolla and Craig raided the home of Louis Billiard, 48 Avenue road they were told by the owner that they had made a "great mistake". Billiard was charged in Police Court on Tues. with selling beer contrary to the Ontario Liquor Control Act.

The officers in evidence stated that they had observed the accused's home for nearly forty minutes and had seen him serve beer to four people and one for himself. During part of the time there had been two couples dancing and the music prevented them from hearing any conversation that may have taken place. They did however hear Billiard say to one of the men, L. Castonguay, "Deux Piastres Pour La Biere". They also saw Castonguay make a motion towards his pocket and it seemed that Billiard told him that it was the turn of the other male party E. Dubeau, who passed the accused a bill which he took into the kitchen to change. It was while he was engaged in changing the money that the officers entered.

Shown in court as exhibits were a \$20 bill the property of Dubeau, and \$13 made up of a ten, a two and a one which the officers claimed was the change Billiard was making up when they entered. There was also a number of empty bottles and five full ones.

For the defence Gregory Evans objected to the claim that the constables could hear and understand only one phrase in French and drew the admission from both that they understood very little French. Addressing the court he said: "It is strange that the only words they understood were those detrimental to my client."

In cross examination both Castonguay and Dubeau denied paying for beer. The former first stated that he offered to pay but pressed by Crown Attorney S. A. Caldwell, K.C., charged it to offering a repayment for the care the daughters of the accused had given his children while he and his wife were out.

Dubeau stated that since he lived ten miles out of town he considered that he might want change to pay a hotel bill or taxi fare and that Billiard was changing the twenty when they were raided. The witnesses got confused in their testimony and Billiard differed from both but the magistrate found Billiard not guilty and the case was dismissed.
