Should Be Careful In Use of 2,4-D

Many farmers are now interested in the use of 2,4-D chemicals for the control of weeds in grass and cereal crops, but care should be taken by farmers in the use of these chemicals, says A. M. W. Carter, Plant Products Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture, in charge of pesticides.

For application on a farm scale the use of mechanical dispensers is necessary. In choosing machinery for this purpose, it should be remembered, says Mr. Carter that 2,4-D will injure many broadleaved cultivated crops and that the safest machine to use is one which gives the best control over where the spray or dust is placed. If spray or dust escapes and drifts on the wind to trees, hedges, or susceptible crops, there may be damage. Obviously even the machinery giving the best control should be used when there is little or no wind and at those times in the day when there is least likelihood of "dust devils" and whirlwinds being created by the sun's heat.

These same considerations should also be borne in mind when farmers are contracting with some machine or aircraft operator to control the weeds in a crop. While damage to one's own susceptible crops or windbreaks might be regarded as bad luck, damage to a neighbors property could be expensive. Such possibilities ought not to be overlooked when signing contracts for weed control.
