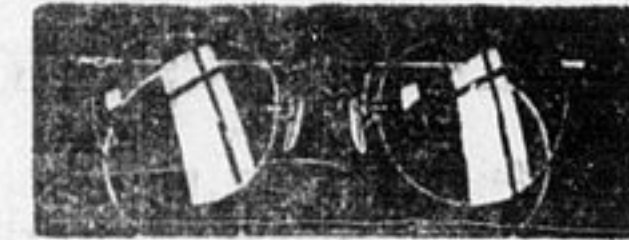
Mr. Banks was presented with a handsome electric razor and guests spent the evening socially and in dancing.

The expenditures for the use of the building, salaries, telephone and supplies amounted to \$2,147.05. Leaving a balance at July 31, 1947, of \$26.91. Mrs. Runnals moved a vote of thanks to H. J. Fuke, manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce for auditing the books.

Guest speaker of the evening was Mrs. Wendell Brewer who chose as her subject "Behind the Scenes With Parents and Children." She opened her address with the very interesting question—"What do we want most for our children?"

"Happiness," was the answer. Happiness, the talented speaker went on to say, is or becomes dependent on hereditary and environment, general appearance, stature and coloring are more or less stable but environmental factors are not. It is the parents, too, who in most instances who must take the responsibility for whatever tension exists in the family.

Mrs. Brewer stated, "The environment of children is moulded by his parents and the child is moulded by that environment. One moment all is peace and harmony in the home and the next for any number of reasons there is turmoil, what is important for parents to know is that in most instances it is they who can create a sense of security of peace and harmony."

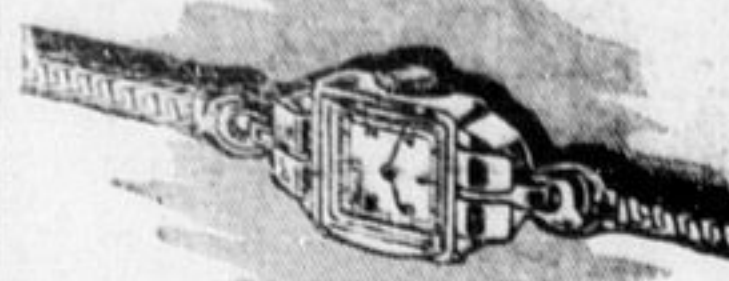
Continuing, she said, "The happy home is most likely to develop the happy crowd. The abnormally aggressive child, the child who cries easily, the bed-wetter, the child who is constantly in search of attention, who is

given to temper tantrums, the stammerer and stammerer—any of these children and all of them may readily be the product of unfavorable and unhappy circumstances.

Mrs. Brewer during her interesting and educational address also pointed out certain of the more common parental attitudes and patterns of behaviour. Included among these were the parents who quarrel incessantly. Over ambitious parents, the over-indulgent parent, the parent who is guilty of comparing the child unfavorably in public especially to his disadvantage. The family where father or mother are always tired and irritable. The parents who are frequently away from home for social or business reasons. The over protective parent, all these stated Mrs. Brewer so towards the making for unhappiness and the failures of many.

Following the enlightening address, a vote of thanks was tendered Mrs. Brewer by Mrs. J. P. Teeple, supervisor of the Kindergarten.

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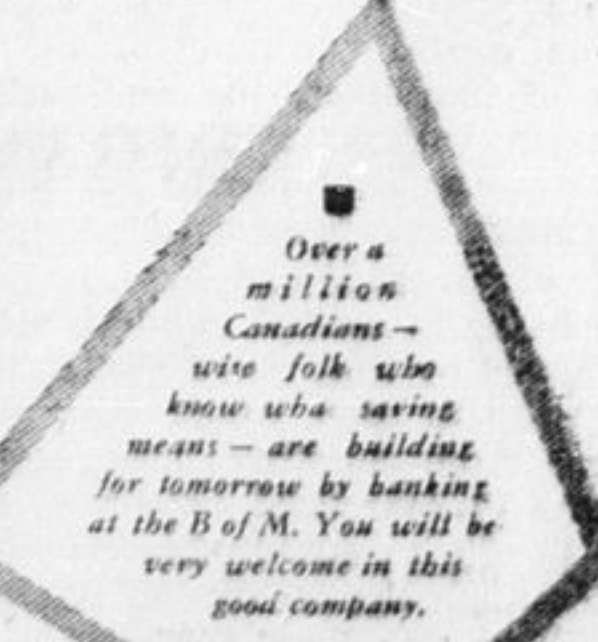
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
