NOTICE

TOWN OF TIMMINS PROPOSED BY-LAW

Being a by-law to authorize the construction of a garage and workshop for the Corporation.

Whereas it is deemed expedient that a garage and workshop for the Corporation be constructed upon a site to be selected at the expense of the Corporation at large.

Now therefore be it enacted as a by-law of the Town of Timmins as follows:

1. A garage and workshop shall be constructed on a site to be selected at the expense of the Corporation at large.

2. The mayor and the clerk shall subject to the approval of the council to be declared by resolution engage the services of a qualified architect who shall forthwith make such plans, profiles and specifications and furnish such information as may be necessary for the making of a contract for the execution of the work.

3. The cost of labor and material for the construction of the said garage and workshop shall not exceed the sum of \$75,000.00.

4. The work shall be carried on and executed under the superintendence and according to the directions and orders of the Engineer of the Corporation.

5. The mayor and clerk are authorized to cause a contract for the construction of the work to be made and entered into with some person or persons, firm or corporation subject to the approval of the Council to be declared by resolution.

6. The treasurer may (subject to the approval of the Council) agree with any bank or person for temporary advances of money to meet the cost of the work pending the completion of it.

7. The debentures to be issued for the loan to be effected to pay for the cost of the work when completed shall bear interest at the rate of 2 1/2% per annum, or such other rate as may be decided upon by the Council, and shall be made payable in ten annual instalments.

1. Victor Salomaa, DO HEREBY CERTIFY that the above is a true copy of a proposed by-law which, if the assent of the electors is obtained to it, will be taken into consideration by the Council on the 22nd day of December, 1947. The votes of the electors upon the proposed by-law will be taken on the 19th day of December, 1947, at the annual Municipal election.

The 10th day of December at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon at the Municipal Building has been fixed and the time and the place for the appointment of persons to attend at the polling places and at the final summing up of the votes by the clerk.

A tenant who desires to vote on the proposed by-law must deliver to the clerk not later than the 10th day before the 19th of December, 1947, a declaration under the Canada Evidence Act that his lease extends for the time in which the money to be raised by the proposed by-law is payable, and that he has by the lease covenanted to pay all Municipal taxes in respect of the property other than local improvement rates.
