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Color of Shoes Can Now Blend With Every Costume

Today's exciting fashions bring our everyday shoes into almost startling focus. Shoe stylists are working hand in hand with top-flight fashion designers to obtain a balanced co-ordination in the costume ensemble, and this of course includes the shoe.

The present costume silhouette with its long full skirt and variable hemline brings shoes into the limelight with greater insistence. Color, style, and fabric—whether leather, kid or other material—contribute to the picture.

Sports Style for Walking

For walking, you may choose a medium heel, closed-toe, sport type shoe with a side lace and a stitched extension leather sole. Afternoons inspire everything that is feminine; and with a dressmaker suit, there's nothing more pleasing than a slim pump, or perhaps a bow pump, or a classic black patent opera.

With a slightly more formal suit, high-heeled shoes move in confidently. And then again there is the cuffed boot, or a suede strap model with a high platform.

Individuality for Evening

Where evening is concerned, you can pretty well let your taste have a fling just as you play with your skirt lengths, choosing what pleases you best. Gold kid steps out in front as one of the season's favorites. These "golden slippers" are sometimes so light that there is little visible but a flat-sole sandal and some very intricate straps; again they take on a more substantial aspect, as in the case of a smooth bronze kidskin mounted on a high leather-soled platform, or one of the same handled in a dark brown satin.

This is a season of color in shoes. You can get almost any shade you have set your heart on. Mocha, beige, and gray, once difficult to find—are now back in force. In suede pumps or sandals, they are good, but of course with the right clothes.

Black suede with gold or silver pipings is interesting for dressy occasions. You find something new in a brilliant green leather with tan piping.

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Green pepper is a new shade, somewhat darker than the ubiquitous Kelly green. Burnt mocha, a reddish brown, townbrown, and a shade called gypsy brown, about the tone of milk, show the increasing variety of shades in a single color.

Looking ahead to shoes for resort wear, which are necessarily light-hearted and gay in their colors, you find such vivid tones as rancho tan (Palomino), gay green, red flame, pure white and off white as well as a soft, pearly gray. Royal blue, in smooth calf as well as in suede, appears on the horizon of the resort but doubtless will be more useful in resort shoes than for everyday purposes.

Popular Cherry Red

Cherry red will not be over-looked. In fact you see an unusual number of red calf shoes in bright shades making the present fashion set-up. Ambering themselves very much at home in brown is seen in tailored style, as in a calf spectator pump showing white-stitched throat ornaments which match the white stitching on an extension sole.

Design and silhouette are stressed and many new concepts make their appearance. Take for example the little jabot vamp. The jabot stands on its head and flutters upwards in a closed wall pump of black suede, yet it gives the foot a pleasing line.

Variety of Ankle Straps

Ankle straps, for the delicately turned ankle, take many forms. They may be bracelets attached to the back of the shoe. Again you find them in a high-heeled pump circling to a close at the side back from a tapered tongue which covers the instep. The same type shoe is made by the Julianellis in a black suede princess sandal in a low wedge.

Far from the stiff use of leathers, confined to tailored effects, you see today some of the highlights of fashion executed in delicate dressmaker touches where gathering, pleating,

Both closed and open styles are in demand. Canadian women like the freedom and comfort of the open show the swirling vamp. You also see a newcomer in the spatlike pump. Asymmetric strap arrangements continue their ingenious patterns, as well as double straps covering ankle and instep.

But in the whole fashion picture the blending of color in clothes, hose, and throughout your costume will be shoes, and the maintenance of a mood strengthened if you keep an eye on your shoes.

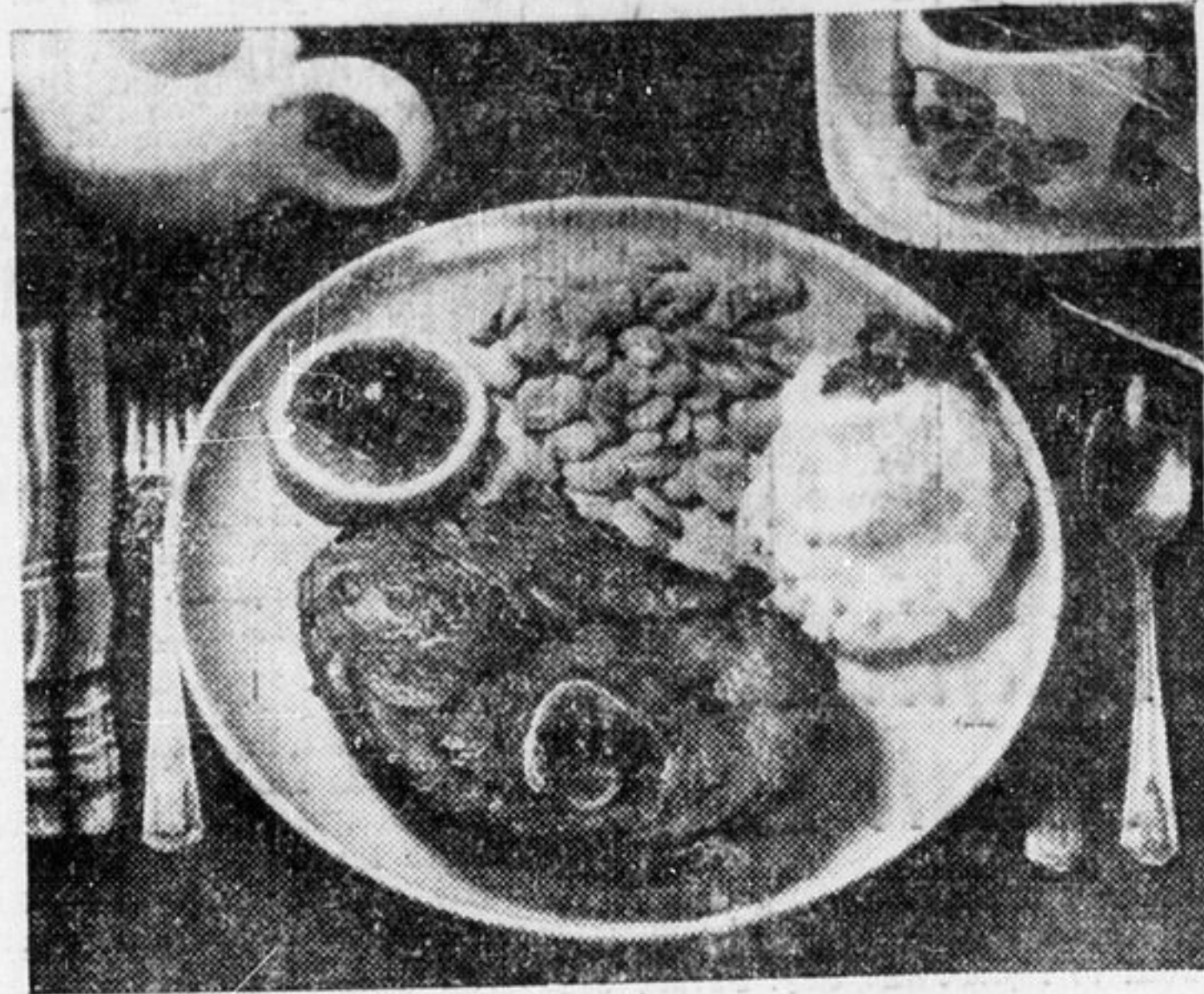
RICE AND OLD SHOES

Savory Lamb Shoulder Chops



Juicy and delightfully tasty, Savory Lamb Shoulder Chops come to the table dressed up with a lemon slice topped with mint jelly, fluffy mashed potatoes and lima beans. All of this is planned to satisfy the most discerning appetite and bring forth exclamations of approval from everyone at the table.

To prepare the Savory Shoulder Chops brown 4 chops thoroughly on both sides in a heavy frying pan. Then combine 1 teaspoon of salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt, 1 teaspoon paprika, 1 tablespoon vinegar and 2 tablespoons water and pour the mixture over the chops. Turn the chops, cover them and simmer for 25 to 30 minutes, turning them once during the cooking. Serve very hot.

Lamb is plentiful these days and that's mighty good news to the families who have saved their lamb meals for special company or family birthdays.

True it is that leg of lamb and thick loin chops are tops in party fare, but there are ten or more thrifty cuts that become family favorites. Cooks aiming for both economical and interesting meals will delight in the number of unusual dishes which the thrifty lamb cuts provide. Because lamb is tender and delicately flavored, nearly all cuts are well suited to roasting, broiling, or pan broiling. In this respect lamb differs from other meats which have less tender cuts requiring braising or stewing.

Well-brown 1-inch thick neck slices are rapidly achieving popularity with families who enjoy the flavor of broiler meats. Tender lamb riblets, which are cut from the lower portion of the rib section, readily lend themselves to broiling, pan broil or cooking in combination with other foods such as rice and tomatoes. They are flavorful and juicy and yet economical. Another sure-to-please meat dish is ground lamb, made into patties and served with generous amounts of grating having that distinct

lamb flavor. Or the ground meat can be made into a loaf and served in slices with mint sauce.

Many people class shoulder lamb chops as the ultimate in fine eating. However, besides displaying tenderness, juiciness, and a distinctive flavor, shoulder chops provide a thrifty dinner service. Like other chops they can be broiled or pan broiled, but for a change why not try Savory Lamb Shoulder Chops. They are as delicious as their name implies. Serve them garnished with a slice of lemon topped with shimmering green mint jelly. Complete the meal with mashed potatoes, lima beans, frozen fruit salad, and floating island.

COVER GARBAGE
