St. Paul's Anglican Church Observes 36th Anniversary

The thirty-sixth anniversary of St. Paul's Anglican Church in South Porcupine was observed on Sunday.

The first church (Anglican) in the Porcupine Camp was built in Golden City, destroyed in the fire of 1911. Later that same year services were held in rooms on Golden Avenue. South Porcupine with Rt. Rev. J. G. Anderson Bishop of Moosonee, taking the service.

The first church was built on its present site later in the year and Rev. W. M. Trivett was the first rector of the parish. Other ministers succeeded him, some of them students from Wycliffe College. Rev. Marchant was incumbent around 1917, and later services were conducted by Archdeacon J. E. Woodall who came in from Porquits Junction each Sunday to take a service.

It was during the early years of the Archdeacon's ministry that the present church assumed its form of today being practically rebuilt and has since been greatly improved in appearance, and gifts from parishioners have combined to make St. Paul's Anglican Church, South Porcupine one of the most substantial and beautiful in the Diocese of Moosonee.

The service on Sunday morning was conducted by the Rt. Rev. R. J. Renison Bishop of Moosonee who gave the sermon, Rev. J. Morris, present rector assisting in the service.

In the evening Rev. R. Chidwick of St. Matthew's Church, Timmins, preached the sermon and conducted the service.
