News From SOUTH PORCUPINE

Mr. Hyacinth Ferrigan and Mrs. G. Kennedy left on Tuesday for Vinton, Quebec, after hearing that the mother who resides in Vinton had suffered a stroke and was seriously ill.

Miss Anna Sullivan of Main St. has returned home after visiting her nephew Mr. Frank Sullivan and Mrs. Sullivan in Halleybury.

At a council meeting held on Monday evening a grant was made to the Timmins Branch of the Children's Aid Society. They agreed to pay \$1 per day per ward from Tisdale Township. The Canadian Underwriters Association submitted a test of the new fire engine to be given to Schumacher Fire Department. The council also approved the making of outside rinks for the children of South Porcupine. These rinks not only proved most popular last winter but were the means of keeping young hockey enthusiasts off the highways in the public safety. One is to be made on Cennough Hill, one at the corner of Powell and Huot Sts., one at the corner of William and Main, and one at Gold Centre. The works department floods the rinks and keeps them open for skating. A bylaw was passed prohibiting obstruction of highways and regulating the same. Highways include sidewalks. No person shall obstruct or excavate any highway or bridge in the Township of Tisdale unless specifically authorized in writing by Council to do so. Sufficient flares, lamps or lanterns must be lighted, placed and maintained upon the highway or bridge in proximity to said obstruction between dusk and dawn visible at 500 feet. No person may injure or foul any bridge or highway. Council is authorized and empowered to require doorsteps, porches or other erections, or things projecting into or over any highway in the Township of Tisdale to be removed by owner or occupier. No person shall build or maintain any fence on any highway. No person is to deposit firewood or anything calculated to obstruct highway or bridge or interfere with public travel, and to remove upon notification. No person shall throw, place or deposit on any highway or bridge, dirt, filth, glass, handbills, paper or other rubbish or the carcass of any animal. No person shall obstruct any ditch or culvert upon any highway. Fine not to exceed \$50. Reeve Evans in comment on the bylaw remarked that it need not necessarily be enforced in every particular case, but it was an instrument whereby people could be made to show consideration for the public in the matter of obstructing public pathways. In the matter of residents whose practice of dumping firewood in front of their residences has caused annoyance in the past, the bylaw could enforce its discontinuance. A community program of training in physical fitness within the meaning of the regulations under the Department of Education Act (R.S.O. Chapter 356) shall be carried on in the Township of Tisdale. The following were appointed and created a local committee within the meaning of the regulation aforesaid and the said committee shall carry out and perform such duties as may be necessary. Carrying out and furthering the said community program including such duties as may be required by the council aforesaid and by the Department of Education Act including regulations passed thereunder.
