

# MORE CANDIDATES SPEAK THEIR OPINIONS

Due to limitations of space in this edition of the Advance (the largest edition in some years) it has proven to be impossible to give all candidates running for council all the space which the editor would like to give them to describe their proposals for Timmins in 1948. The candidates below are the victims of this condition. However, we will attempt to describe briefly the proposals and background of these men.

**Karl Eyre**  
Mr. Eyre, who arrived in Timmins in 1915, is a veteran of seven years experience on council. Before commencing his present machinery business in 1922, Mr. Eyre had a wide range of employment in the Porcupine, including work on construction crews at both Hollinger and McIntyre. He is an ardent curler and golfer. Like Mr.

Roberts, he has striven to keep the current campaign for mayor as devoid of mud-slinging as possible. "I can't promise that taxes will be reduced if I am mayor," Mr. Eyre said at the election meeting at Harmony Hall last night. "Though I will certainly make every effort to do so. What I wish to accomplish is to get the town's business down, efficiently, promptly and harmoniously during 1948. I believe I am particularly adapted to assist in one of the town's most important departments, the works department."

**Ray Stevenson**  
Mr. Stevenson, a former captain in the Canadian Armoured Corps, is local organizer for the "Labor Progressive Party."  
The outstanding plank on Mr. Stevenson's program is the provision of one half-pint of milk free to the school children of Timmins, to rectify the decrease in milk consumption due to recent increases in prices.

"This can be done for approximately \$50,000 a year," Mr. Stevenson said last night at Harmony Hall. "Negotiations should be opened with the Provincial government in carrying out such a project. This is particularly true now that the Royal Commission on milk has recommended that free milk be given for distribution in the schools."

An equitable settlement of the Mines Profit Tax issue is also demanded by Mr. Stevenson.

At the present time we get less than 10 percent of our tax revenue from industry, whereas in normal communi-

ties this figure runs from 35 percent to 40 percent. A balance can be made only by obtaining our proper proportion of mining tax."

**Philip Fay**  
Mr. Fay has served the town of Timmins for sixteen years, on the school board and council. Five times he has been a councillor. He is now in his 27th year at Hollinger Mine. He served in both World War I and World War II.

He is past Grand Knight and Past District Warden of the Knights of Columbus. He is the father of six children.

Last evening at Harmony Hall Mr. Fay emphasized that one of his chief concerns was the welfare of the town's children.

"I believe that some sort of covered rink for our youngsters comes ahead of the arena on which the plebiscite will be taken this election. The garage is badly needed, but it can wait another year or two."

President Len Bradley of the C.C.F. chaired the meeting in a capable manner.


