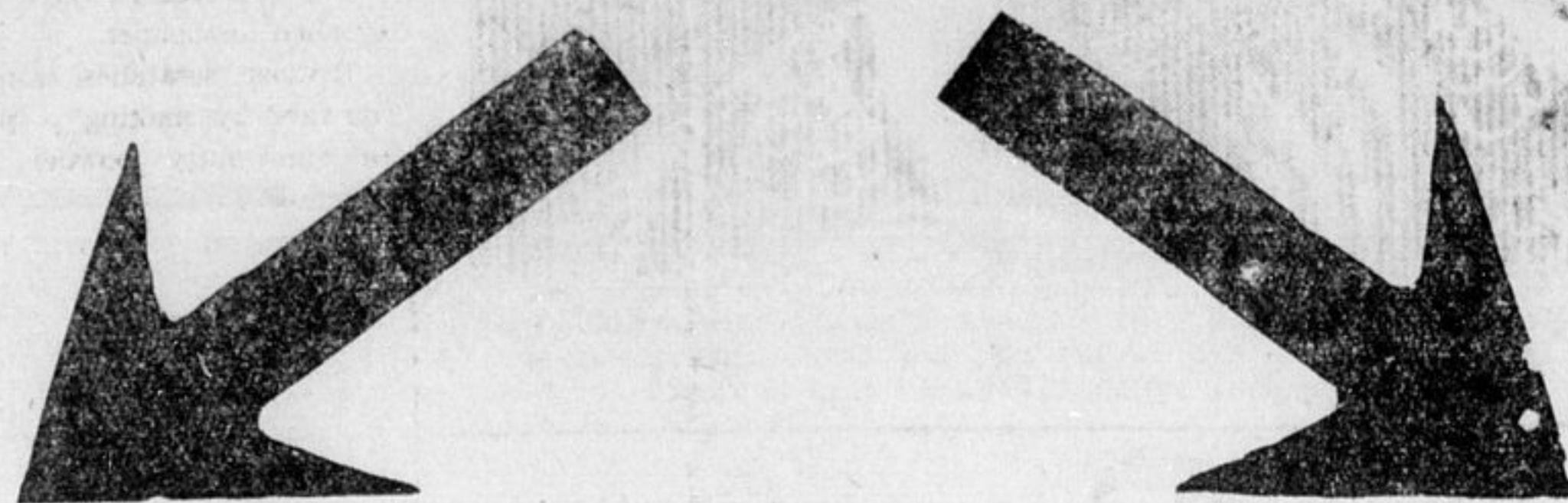


VOTE AND RE-ELECT!



A resident of the Porcupine since the days it was a trail through the bush in 1910. Arrived first in the North at Cobalt in 1908. One of the few living survivors of the famous Porcupine fire of 1911. Has held a miner's licence continually for the past 34 years. First elected to council in 1934. Was mayor of Timmins during 1936, 1937, 1938 and 1939, a period of tremendous expansion, yet with a lower tax rate than that prevailing today. The town hall was built in this period, assessments were equalized, tens of thousands of dollars of new tax revenue were found, electric light rates were reduced. Public got 100 percent value for its tax money. Councillor again in 1941, 1942, and re-elected last year. Justly deserves the title of "council's watchdog" due to the manner he has kept all members down to business and punctured outlandish schemes from knowledge drawn from wide experience. A man like Bartleman is needed on 1948 council. No one is "going to get away with anything" while he is present.



A resident here since 1915. Has displayed vital interest in public affairs ever since, particularly at they apply to the youth of the town. Was secretary-treasurer of the Separate School Board as early as 1918-1919. Served as a high school trustee during 1926 and 1927. Was town councillor in 1930, 1934 and 1935. Ran and was re-elected by solid margin last year. Despite calculated and misrepresentative ridicule cast by The Press this year, has always been and continues to be considered an able, conscientious and efficient administrator by the large segment of the population which knows his record. Considers that one of the first tasks of council is to establish a public utilities commission in order to reduce electricity costs in both homes and places of business. Is noteworthy for the time and energy he has spent sponsoring and assisting the Timmins Community Activities Committee (has missed only two of the weekly meetings of the TCAC all year, both times due to illness). Always interested in the welfare of the town's youth, he believes that the first capital expenditure the town should undertake when funds are available is the erection of a low-cost arena.
