The Mayor and Town Council of Iroquois Falls were sworn in to Office at the meeting held last Monday. The oath of office was administered by the Clerk-Treasurer, Mr. T. C. Dobson.

His Worship Mayor P. J. Redmond appointed a Striking Committee whose duty is to bring in a slate of Committees for the current term. This Committee is composed of Councillors H. Reed, P. J. Clarke, T. Cybolski, and P. W. Burton. Their report is to be presented at the next regular meeting of the Council.

The Mayor also appointed the members of the Court of Revision and the Public Welfare Committee. The Court of Revision is composed of Councillors H. Reed, T. Cybolski, R. H. Powers and L. D.
