On their return they will take up residence in Noranda.

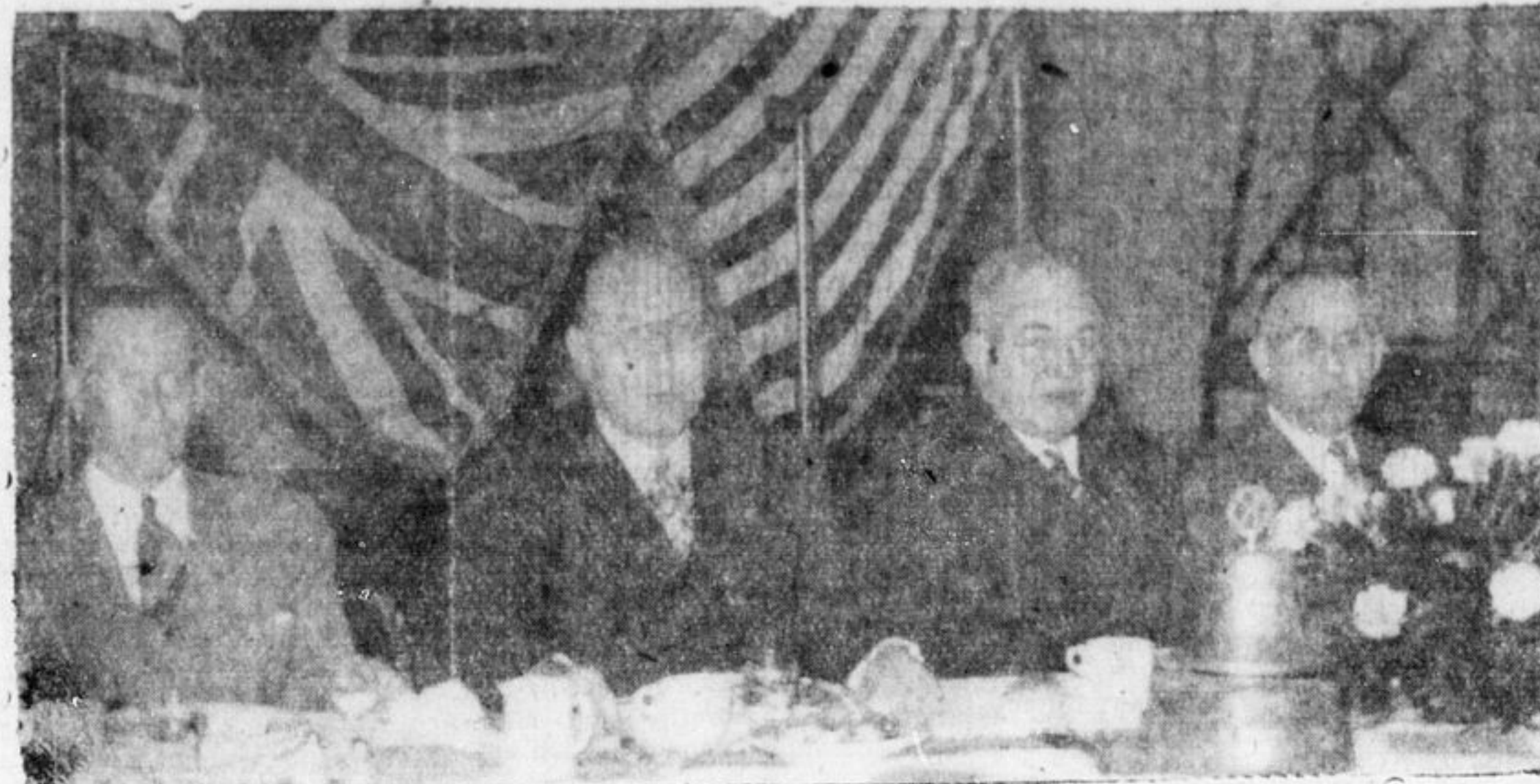
Gifts to the attendants included a sterling silver cigaret lighter to the bridesmaid and a tooled leather wallet to the best man.

**First United Church Report Year's Work New Groups Formed; Help To Others**

First United Church held their thirty-third annual meeting Tuesday evening. There was an excellent attendance, the best on record. A warm friendly spirit permeated the meeting in sharp contrast to the bitter cold of the out-of-doors.

Reports of the year's work was given by the following groups. Session, Committee of Stewards, Woman's Missionary Society, Woman's Association, Fireside Club, Mother's Group, Choir, Young Adult Club, Young Peoples Union, Playmates and Church Vacation School.

These reports were all encouraging Church School, Canadian Girls in Training, Explorer Girls, Tuxis, Pathfinder Trail Rangers, Explorer Boys, and revealed an amazing record of service. Among the highlights were: the church's contribution to others, by means of missionary givings, and aid to Britain, Europe and Asia, a total of \$4500.
