A most enjoyable time was spent by the ladies and later in the afternoon the hostess served a dainty lunch.



**Kinsmen Ladies and Northern Zone Night  
Gala Affair; Featuring Dinner, Dance**

There is only one race regardless of color or creed and that is our reason for being here" District Governor Russ Thompsons, of Kirkland Lake, told Kinsmen, their wives and friends at "Ladies Night" held in the Empire Hotel on Saturday evening.

"Since holding a district office it has been my privilege to charter six new Kinsmen Clubs. Each time there is a new thrill to it. It is a thrill because I am able to review with our new friends the history of the organization."

"I am carried back to that small Chinese cafe in Hamilton in 1920 when our founder Hal Rogers, and his friends formed the first Kinsmen Club. I can see them awakening to the realization that service to their fellowmen would fill a need in their lives that could be satisfied in no other way.

"However, the club's growth was rather slow, until 1935 when Banty Banick became general secretary, then it took on design and purpose. Banty travelled all over the Dominion, Mr. Thompsons told the gathering, forming clubs and getting people interested.

"At the beginning of the war up until 1939 there were 85 clubs with a membership of 2,500 persons, today there is established 206 clubs with a membership of 8,000.

"Kinsmen have made an enviable record especially during the war years. Their works and donations to various causes have been numerous. During those years alone the Kinsmen Clubs donated over 30 millions of milk to the Milk for Britain Fund," he said.

"The objective of Kinsmen are five: That we may be improved in modern business and professional ethics; that the interest of each in the welfare of his community may be stimulated; that constitutional authority may be upheld; that the spirit of cooperation tolerance and understanding between all nations and all peoples be fostered and stimulated; and that unity of thought throughout our Dominion be established toward their goal; and that we carry on service work within our community, continuing Mr. Thompsons said, there is not much difference in our aims or motivations than in similar service organizations throughout Canada.

Mr. Thompsons definition of Kinsmen was "He is Kinsmen let it mean, that he has served and he has seen, the depths of misery and pain, around him-and his duty plain. He'll strive some health and help to bring. The needy and the suffering. The story does not end there either," he said, "because there will be no end as long as there are Kinsmen."

Following the introduction of guests Dr. J. E. Barnard proposed a toast to the ladies to which Mrs. Duke Werther replied. Three other toasts were proposed, one to the King, by president B. Robinson, one to the founder, Hal Rogers, by Charlie Leppan and one to the association by R. B. Stock.

In his toast to the founder, Mr. Leppan read a letter from Hal Rogers.
