Canon Chidwick opened the meeting with prayer, and complimented Mr. Harold Burt, secretary-treasurer of the Plan, on the monumental work, the time and vital interest that he had devoted to it, together with all his co-workers.

In his address Canon Chidwick stated that the past six months had more than proven his hopes for success in the operation of the Calendar Year Plan. Some, at its inauguration had felt that the small sum asked for weekly would never build the Church, but the plan has worked exceedingly well; it is the very life blood of the Church. With all that, however, it is extremely important that the number of years required to pay off the incurred debt be decreased.

Mr. J. Stovel on behalf of Vestry, admitted that Vestry is responsible for liquidation of debt, and realized that without Calendar Year Plan Workers this could not be accomplished. He pointed out that finances were in a healthy condition, but by increasing effort mortgage could be retired in less time than called for in contract.

Mr. Harold Burt thanked all his co-workers on the Plan for their efforts during 1947, and hoped for even more success during the current year. He closed the meeting after endorsing a vote of thanks to Mr. Stan Fowler in auditing the financial statement of the Calendar Year Plan.
