SOUTH PORCUPINE Mrs. H. Robertson Dies At South End

Mrs. Hilma Robertson of the "Dome Pump-house" died in Porcupine General Hospital on Thursday following illness after a heart attack.

She was an old resident of South Porcupine having lived in the camp for nearly thirty years. She came to live at the Dome from Copper Cliff, soon after her marriage. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lahti, also of Copper Cliff were residing at the Dome at the time.

Her husband, "Jack" Robertson, died some years ago soon after leaving the Dome property to reside at the pump-house across the lake, and after his death she continued to carry on the work required there.
