Tax And

The taxes and water rates in Matheson have been raised considerably this year. This is due in part to the increased cost of labour and materials. The sewer pipes are wooden due to the fact that they were the best obtainable in 1913 when, as now, materials were at a premium. However, they were guaranteed for twenty years and have past that by another ten years. It must also be taken into consideration that in 1918 the traffic was light compared with the present trucks, tractors, and machinery that are hauled over the streets of Matheson daily.

Highway No. 11 has run through the main street since 1927 and this last year the Matheson Quebec Highway No. 55, runs into town on part of Fourth Avenue, making two highways in a small town. This highway is still under construction which brings extra heavy traffic over these antiquated sewer pipes. It is not surprising that the taxes have raised to meet the increased cost of material and labour. On the other hand, not many small towns have two main streets kept up by the Department of Highways winter and summer. They are 5th avenue and part of 4th avenue.

Dispute Over

One of the Divisional court cases before Judge Dan's held Monday, March 8, in Cochrane of local interest was the case of F. Levaque of Anthony vs. Mr. Dumont of Val Cegne. William E. Hub of Timmins to defend Mr. Levaque while Mr. Dumont had Gregory T. Evans. Witnesses for Mr. Levaque were Mr. George Passaw, Hoyle and Mrs. T. Levaque.

The trouble arose out of hay allegedly purchased from Mr. Levaque by Mr. Dumont. The agreement was that Mr. Dumont purchase the hay at \$20 per ton beled. W. Clarke of Monteith was hired to bale the hay.

This was done and the hay inspected and found satisfactory. Mr. Dumont took several tons and paid for same. He left the balance and refused to pay for it. Judgement was given Mr. Levaque. Mr. Dumont has to pay for the hay with court costs.
