Fine Report Is Tabled By South Porcupine VON

The annual meeting of the Porcupine Branch, Victorian Order of Nurses held Thursday, March 18th, in the Council Chambers, South Porcupine was well attended. R. P. Kinkel, Immediate Past President presided due to the sickness of President W. S. Gardner on that evening.

The statement of receipts and disbursements for the year 1947 showed a net balance of \$2,888.50, expenditures having included the purchase of a new car for the use of the nursing staff.

Miss Ellen Pocock, nurse in charge gave an interesting and illuminating report of the nursing work of the year. A total of 3508 visits to 610 patients were made by the nurse in charge and relief nurse Mrs. Grace Bennett.

The number of patients cared for and the number of visits made shows a marked increase over the figures for 1946 and evidences the increased confidence and appreciation of the public in the services provided by the Victorian Order of Nurses.

The Victorian Order of Nurses for Canada was founded 50 years ago and in that time has grown to embrace 100 branches, employing almost 500 nurses. Miss Pocock expressed her appreciation of the fine co-operation rendered by the officers and directors of the branch, by the doctors, the hospital, and by the public in general.

A round film depicting the special training given V. O. N. nurses and their work in the field was shown by Mrs. D. W. Millar.
