Fur Storage Plant To Open In April

A modern, up-to-the-minute fur storage plant will be opened in Schumacher in the near future, the Advance learned this week. The new concern will be a division of Northern Frosted Foods Limited and will call itself Polar Air Fur Storage. It will be the only plant of its type in the north.

Work is now near completion at the company's premises at 1 First avenue. A large storage room with dimensions of 52 feet by 16 feet by 11 1/2 feet is being constructed. Walls will be more than a foot of thickness of concrete and will be insulated with cork.

Humidity control is being installed as well as temperature control. Correct humidity when furs are stored prevents them from cracking. Manager E. C. Brewer said the plant will open some time early in April.

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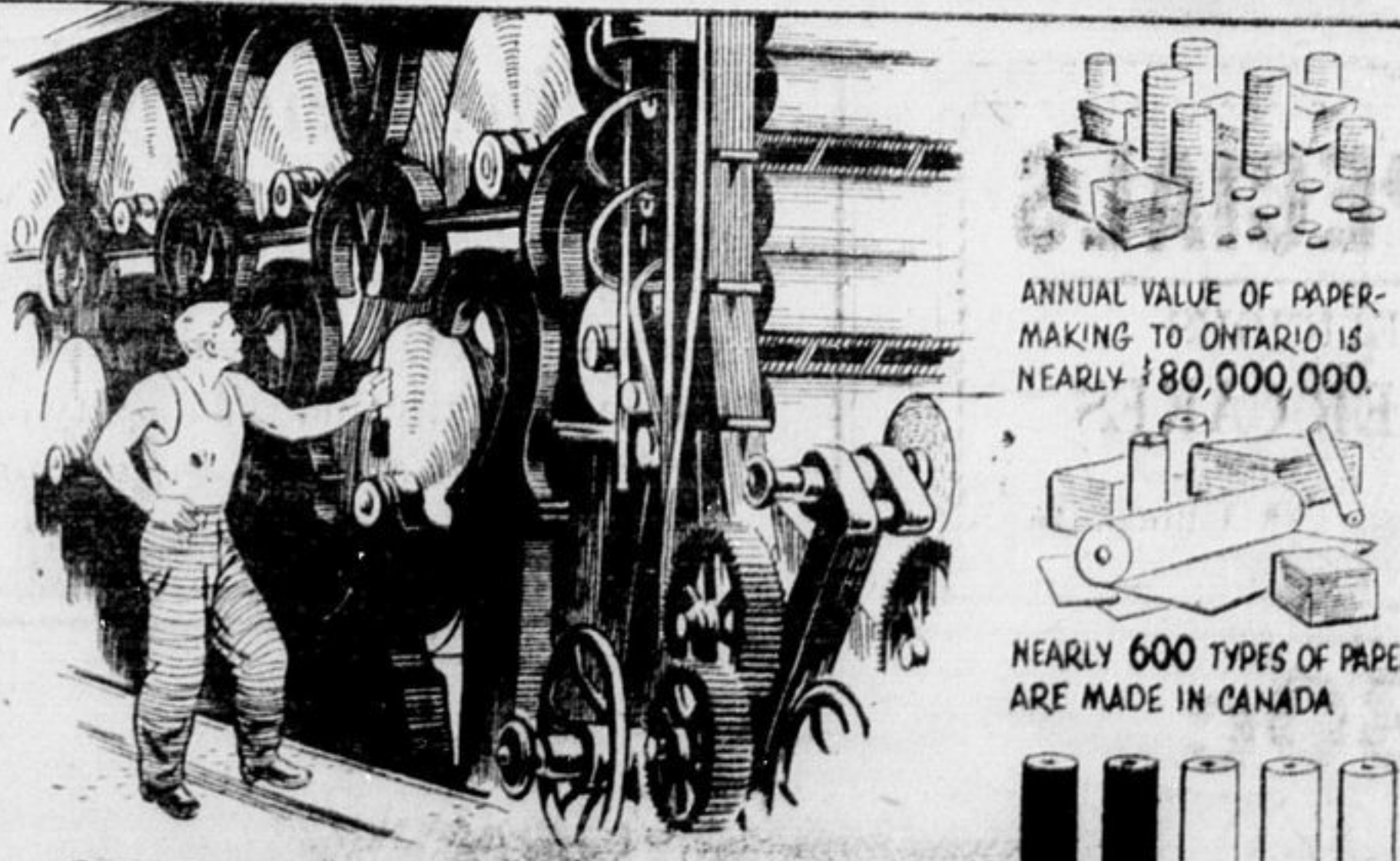
