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Ontario Drama
Festival To Be
Held This Week

For the preliminaries of the Northern Ontario Drama Festival, to be held at the Timmins High and Vocational School on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings of this week, two unusually competent and experienced adjudicators have been secured. Undoubtedly the calibre of the adjudicators will add interest and the value of the events this week. The preliminaries in this zone of the Northern Ontario Drama Festival are sponsored by the Timmins Adult Education Group, with Mrs. J. A. Theriault, Timmins, as convener. One of the adjudicators is Raymond Beriault, of Ottawa, who has unusually prominent standing in Canadian dramatics. He is District Supervisor Bilingual of Community Programmes for Eastern Ontario. For his cultural work in the drama and other fields he was recently made a Knight of the Latin Order by the French authorities - a coveted honour reserved for only the most outstanding. Mr. Beriault has directed many plays in Ottawa and Montreal with outstanding success. He is a leading member of Le Cavaud, a group that has won the award for the best French play at the Dominion Drama Festival, four times, winning the Bessborough trophy the first year it was awarded. The other adjudicator - James E. Dean - is of equally high standing. He is one of the officials of the Central Ontario League, and has been a leading spirit in Hart House dramatics and similar activities. Other special visitors to Timmins this week for the Drama Festival will be: Ken Young of North Bay, district supervisor of Community Programmes for Northern Ontario; and Miss E. A. Mackenzie, Toronto, assistant supervisor Drama Dept., Community Programmes.

Miss Alma Lauritzen, New York, Speaks
To Community Concerts Association.

A concert that is worthwhile is one that you enjoy! Miss Alma Lauritzen of New York City told members of the Community Concerts Association at a dinner held on Monday evening in the McIntyre Auditorium. "Our Community Concerts service brings the audience and the artist together. We bring you all Columbia artists therefore you have all and only top artists on your programs. There are many artists in the country but only a few of these rise to the top. And the only reason our audiences return year after year is because they have enjoyed listening to these artists, now that you have had concerts you understand this much better than at first. Moreover, the artist prefers a Community Concert audience for they claim that these audiences have something no other audience possesses," said Miss Lauritzen. The speaker then proceeded to outline the four different groups that make up an audience. There is the esoteric group which is composed of people whose whole life is devoted to music. The second group is composed entirely of musical hypochondriacs. These people do not attend concerts to enjoy themselves, they go only to criticize. There is the musical group, who attend for the love of music and to enjoy themselves and fourthly, the layman, who also go to enjoy themselves. This fourth group forms the largest audience. "Our job here is to assist you and to serve you so well that your audience will be interested and return year after year. In Timmins your concerts have been so very successful because you people have made it so. That is the major feature of these concerts. They are based on unselfishness." "This evening from Mexico to Newfoundland Community Concerts are holding dinners. The reason for our success are twofold. There is never any debt and never any loss and it belongs entirely to the community and you may have as many concerts as you wish" continued Miss Lauritzen. Dr. M. J. Kelly, president of the local Association, introduced Miss Lauritzen to the gathering. Mr. Phil Kinkel, chairman, extended a vote of thanks to the entertaining speaker.
