

Members International Association Public Employment Service Hold Dinner: Dance

Members of the International Association of Public Employment Services from Toronto, Kirkland Lake, North Bay and other Northern districts gathered in the Lounge Room of McIntyre Arena on Monday evening for a most enjoyable and successful banquet followed by an evening of gaiety and dancing.

Guest speaker was John Beattie, Manager of the Delite Mine, and chairman of the Advisory Committee. Mr. Beattie chose as his theme "Mining and the Miner." There are 13 producing companies operating in this district, said the speaker, and at the end of the year 1946 there was 100 million tons of ore taken out of the camp. That meant at least 30 million ounces of gold ore, comprised of high and low grade ores. At that time the average price of gold was \$29.50 per ounce, today it is a trifle higher.

"The cost of mining also rises with time, labor and supplies, Mr. Beattie informed the gathering, cost of labor has increased 53 1/2 per cent, supplies 100. The average miner, he estimated, earned at least \$2500 per year, the others in proportion to their positions. In speaking of the advantages gained by every citizen on having a Selective Service office he stated "It is the national right of every citizen

to feel and know that there is an organization established where one may go and learn the essentials on how and where to find a job when he is unemployed. To have a job in a going concern is the right of every person. National responsibility is one of the functions of a government and that is to see that one and all have a job," he concluded.

Miss Margaret McIrvine, Toronto, president of the International Association of Placement Officers, brought greetings from the offices in the Queen City and congratulated the local offices upon their splendid record of achievement. "It is my first visit here, I hope it won't be my last, she said, the warm reception I have received takes the chill out of the cold outdoor atmosphere." Her speech contained much informative and interesting material. The trend centred around the various aspects of life as a civil servant. She also outlined the aims of the Association in regard to university courses which would be open to employees, told of the plans for the forthcoming convention and spoke of the progress made on the publication of the organizations magazine.

Greetings were brought to local members by Mr. W. Ramsay, manager of the Kirkland Lake office, A. B. Handley of North Bay, and Mr. Maurice Williams, superintendent of Industrial Relations.
