NOTICE TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS ARE STILL IN EFFECT

Due to the extremely hazardous condition of the bush in Northern Ontario all bush travel has been prohibited by the Department to all unauthorized persons from -

JUNE 2nd to JUNE 15th inclusive

The regulation is for the Safety of the public from forest fires and for the prevention if possible of new forest fires.

All Travel Permits are hereby VOID until further notice. All Burning Permits are cancelled

Settlers are forbidden to set any brush fires and everyone is urgently requested to stay out of the bush.

The Wholehearted co-operation of the people of Northern Ontario is essential to the preservation of our forest.
