Cooking Safeguards Health of Humanity

Science has proven that unpasteurized or raw milk can carry germs which cause such diseases as bovine tuberculosis.

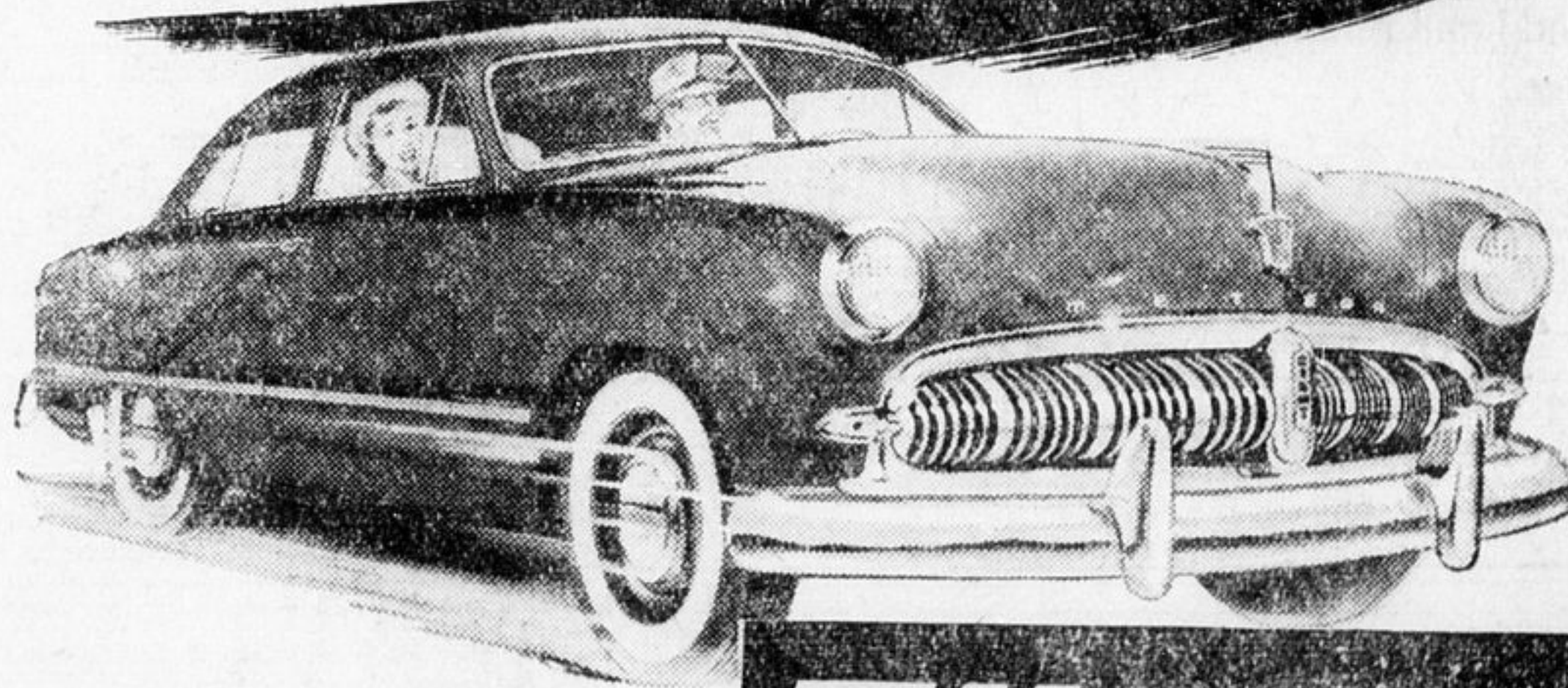
