At the reception held at the White Eagle hall, Mrs. Lubaszka received the guests wearing a dress of grey crepe with green accessories and corsage of red roses.

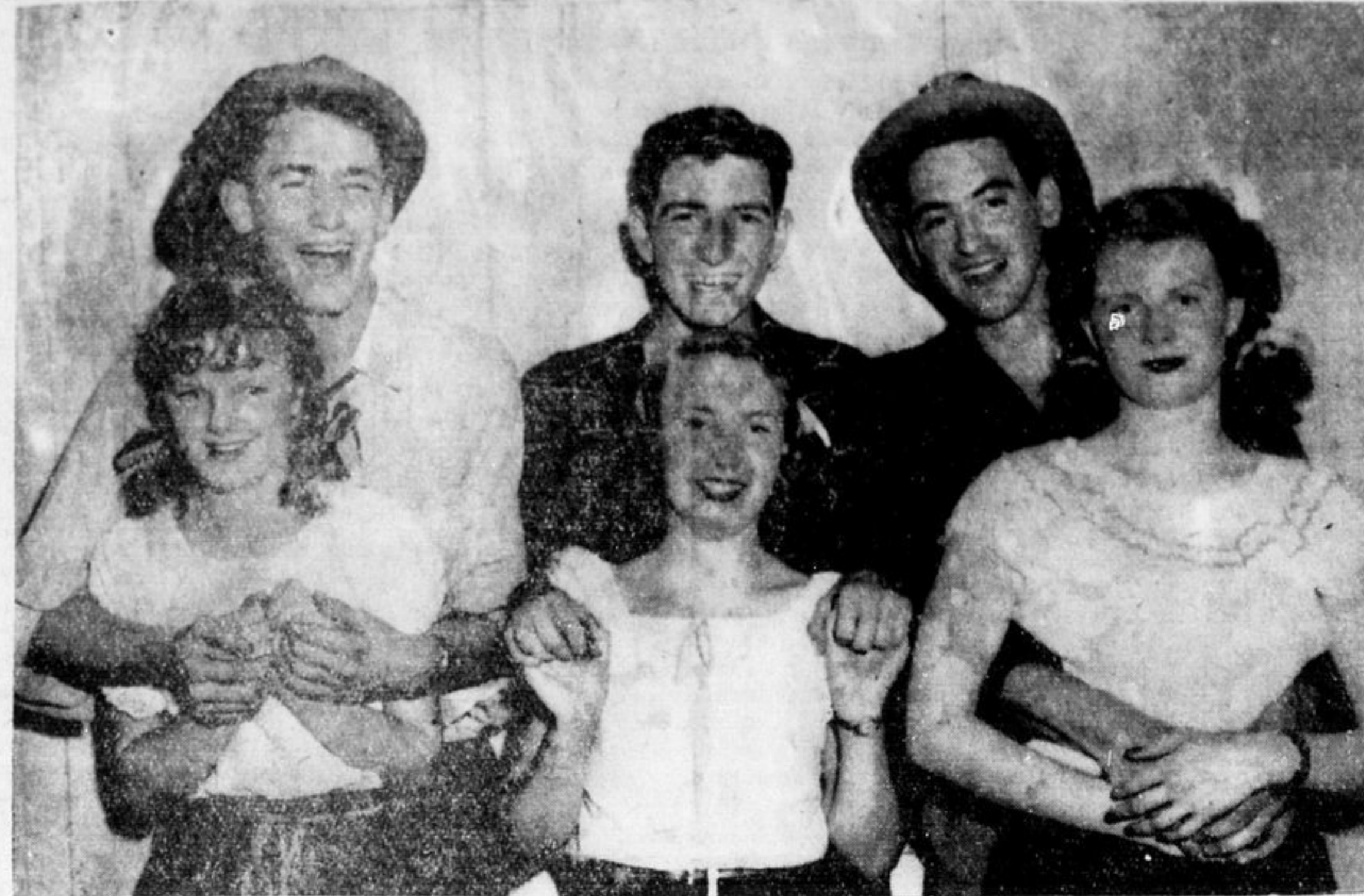
