Briefs From The Weekly Live Stock Market Review

CATTLE - Toronto cattle run was some 2200 head more than in the previous week and also above the same week last year but prices remained unchanged at last week's close. Trading up to three o'clock Monday was very active but then slowed down due to the embargo which went into effect at that time. The run however, was later well cleared with weights steers making \$190 to \$23.50, butcher steers \$19. to \$22.50 and heifers \$16. to \$21. Good butter cows were taken at \$15. to \$16., some lights up to \$17, and common to medium down to \$12, and canners and cutters from \$6. to \$11. Good butcher bulls were bought from \$14.50 to \$16., a few \$16.50 and common down to \$11. Fed yearlings ranged from \$20. to \$23.50 on a fast steady market. Ordinary milkers and springers continued to sell around \$100. to \$160. each.

CALVES - There was considerable recession in calf prices during the week. Toronto, while remaining steady on choice veals at \$22. to \$23. lost \$1 on common to medium.

HOGS - Hog prices were steady, Toronto continued to pay \$31.25 for Grade A. These prices do not include the Dominion Government premium
