"Y's Men Evaluate Program"

At the regular meeting of the Timmins Y's Men's Club, the speaker of the evening was Gower Markle, General Secretary of the Porcupine Community Y. M. C. A., on the subject "Justifying the Y.M.C.A." In his talk, Mr. Markle pointed out the philosophy upon which the Y.M.C.A. program is based and also explained the psychological factors upon which the Group Watt, chairman of the program committee. He said, "In its program, the Y.M.C.A. stresses the value of the individual personality and makes this the focal point of all its activity. It works through these cohesive groups which have a large degree of self-direction and, in this way, taps the source of motivation and meets the personality needs of individuals. 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D.P.'s Fine Citizens Says Mining Assoc.

An additional 700 Displaced Persons have been requested by the mining industry according to the Canadian Metal Mining Association, which is directing the project.

To date about 2300 Displaced Persons—the original quota—are working in mines from Quebec to the Yukon. Selection of the additional 700 has already started in Europe and it is expected the men will begin to arrive this fall.

At the same time, relatives and dependents of men already working in Canada have begun to arrive here and will continue as fast as shipping space and Canadian living quarters are available.

So anxious are some men to have their families with them that already 175 miners have agreed to pay the extra \$175 per person (difference between ship and air passage) to fly their families out. In the few months since they reached Canada, some men have saved as much as \$1000 out of their wages.
