Many Worthy Achievements Attained By St. John Ambulance Brigade

Mrs. E. Anderson, lady district provincial officer, is a visitor to Timmins this week and anyone interested in joining the nursing division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade may get in touch with her through any of the members of the ladies nursing division. The executive would like to familiarize the public with some facts about the organization. First, the Order of St. John is an old one, dating back to the 10th century. It was organized for the purpose of training laymen in the art of administering first aid and home nursing in order that they might be of service to all in time of sickness, accident or emergency. Any service rendered by members is given free of charge. Their motto being "Pro Fide, Pro Utilitate" (For the Faith, For the Sake of Mankind).

There is a man's division and a ladies nursing division which meet separately once a week. Members of the ladies division are required to take two courses of instruction, one in first aid, one in home nursing, under expert guidance. At the completion of each course each member is required to pass an examination, to become a member in good standing.

The local branch has contributed much toward the welfare of the district. During the war years when there was a great shortage of nursing personnel at St. Mary's Hospital they gave more than one thousand hours of their time to help the overworked nurses with their duties. Some also served at Military Hospitals and in voluntary aid departments throughout Canada and overseas. A considerable period of time has also been given to the local blood clinics where they assisted in the task of building up blood banks. Again, they have assisted doctors and nurses at countless immunization clinics held by the Porcupine Health Unit. Assistance has also been given at clinics for crippled children and T.B. clinics. 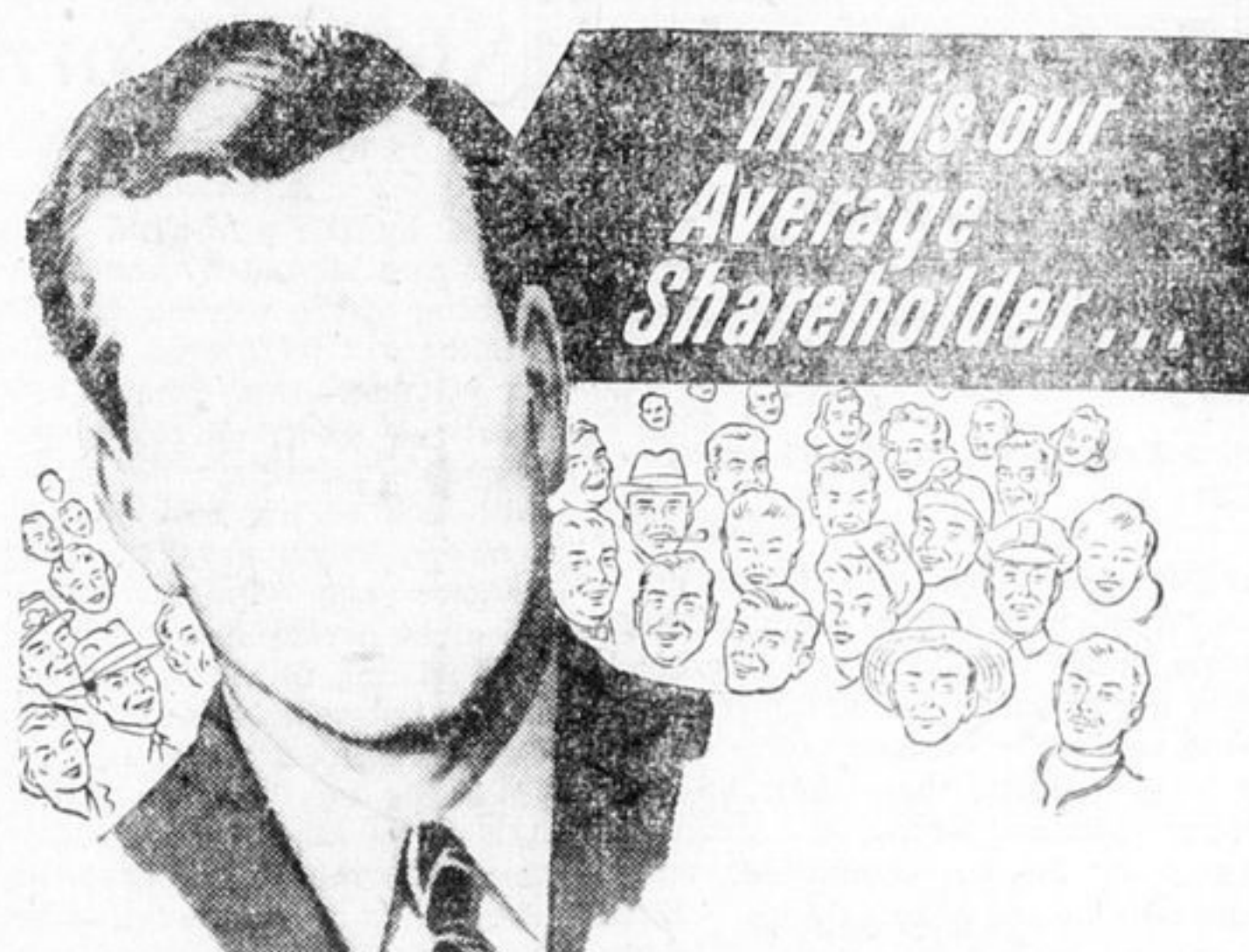
