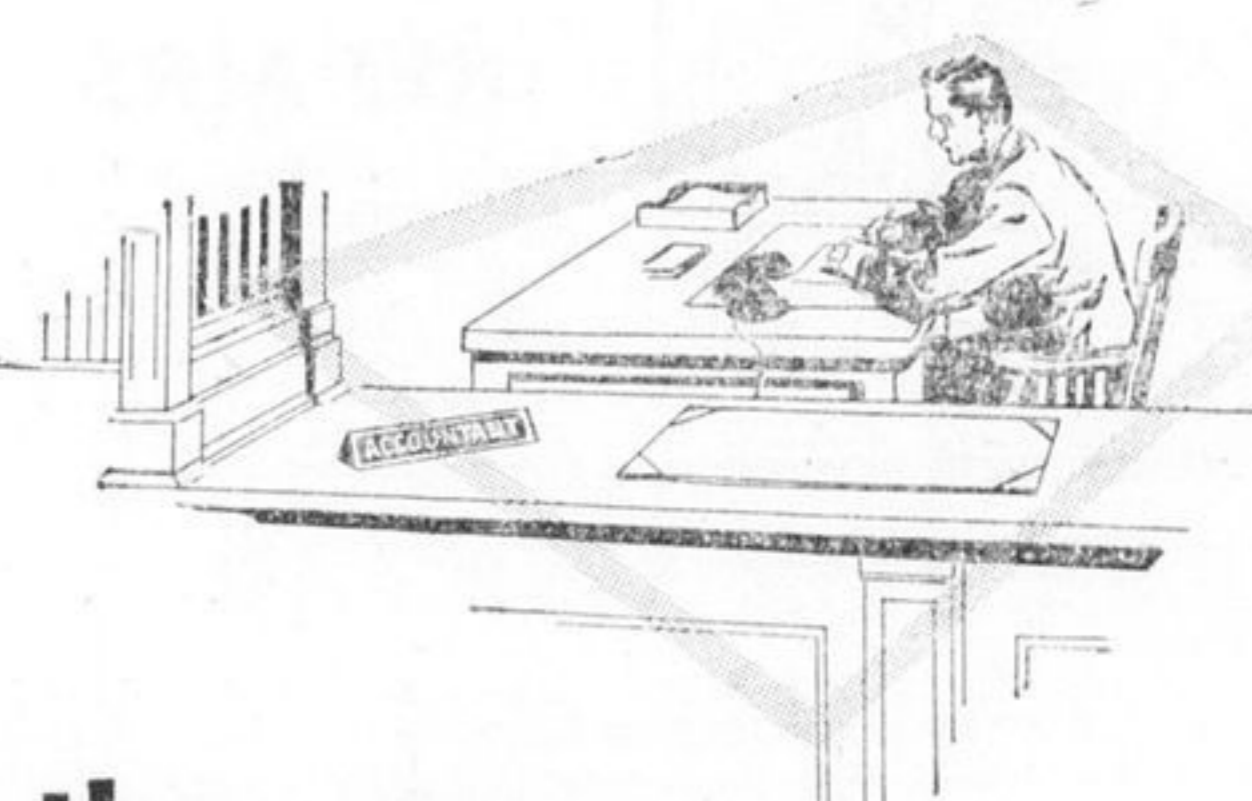

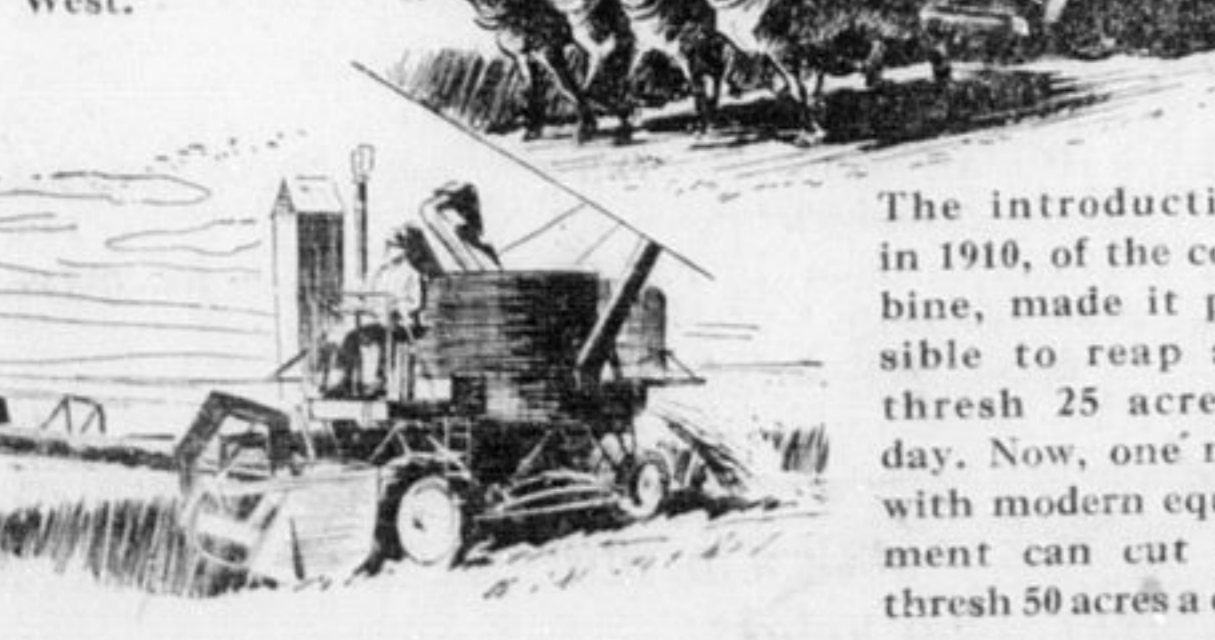


TURNING THE PAGES OF "Canada Unlimited"
