PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that it is the intention of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins to pass the following by-law after due notice thereof has been published in accordance with the Provisions of the Municipal Act.

TOWN OF TIMMINS BY-LAW NO.

BEING A BY-LAW to step up a certain portion of O'Neill Avenue within the Corporation and to permit the Corporation to lease or sell the portion of the said street so stopped up.

WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation deems it desirable to close and stop up a certain portion of O'Neill Avenue, a street within the Corporation.

AND WHEREAS the Council desires to have the right to lease or sell the portion of O'Neill Avenue so stopped up.

AND WHEREAS notice of the intention of the Council has been duly advertised as required by the Municipal Act and all persons who claim that their land would be prejudicially affected by this by-law and who applied to be heard have been heard by the Council.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED AS A BY-LAW OF THE TOWN OF TIMMINS as follows:-

1. That part of O'Neill Avenue as shown on Plan M-7 Cochrane described as follows: COMMENCING at the North East angle of Lot No. 40 according to Plan M-7 Cochrane, thence westerly along the South Boundary of O'Neill Avenue, a distance of sixty-three and three feet, three and three-fifths inches to the North West Angle of said Lot No. 40 thence North twenty-nine degrees 05 minutes East along the West Boundary of said Plan M-7 Cochrane, a distance of seventy-five feet, four and one-fifth inches to a point in the North Boundary of O'Neill Avenue. Thence Easterly along the said North Boundary of O'Neill Avenue, a distance of sixty-six feet, seven and one-fifth inches to the South East angle of Lot No. 53, according to Plan M-7 Cochrane, thence South along the West Boundary of Bellevue Street, a distance of sixty-six feet to the point of commencement, S. hereby closed and stopped up.

2. The Corporation may lease or sell the portion of O'Neill Avenue so closed and stopped up.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that any person who claims that their land will be prejudicially affected by the by-law and who applies to be heard, will be heard by the Council, in person or by his Counsel, Solicitor or Agent at a time to be fixed therefor upon the application to be heard.

United Churches Become Self Supporting Jan. 1st

St. Andrews United Church, Matheson, and five charges join in becoming self-supporting as from January 1st, 1949. Those effected by the movement are, Matheson, Shillington, Missolp, Holyre, Ramore and Wavel. This movement was started several years ago and the congregations of St. Andrews and its five charges have worked hard to accomplish their goal. In the pioneer days services were held by missionaries from both the Presbyterian and Methodist who held services every other week. In 1925 both Presbyterian and Methodists became members of the United Church of Canada. The faithful workers through the years were rewarded Friday evening, November 5th when representatives from all charges met at St. Andrews Church, Matheson, to hear the address from the Rev. J. Lytle, Supt. of Home Missions, (who is well known to the members of long standing as he was in charge here) and the Rev. W. M. Mustard, Convener of Home Missions, Cochrane Presbytery.

The chairman was James A. Moore an Elder and Supt. of Sunday School and a lifelong member of the church. The motion was moved by Mr. J. Elliot, Holyre, seconded by L. Coughlin of Ramore.

This charge may well be called "United" as every protestant religion has assisted in this movement. In Matheson when one church puts on a bazaar members of every church make purchases and help make it a success. The Young Peoples organizations at the United Church is made up of members from all churches. In Shillington two residents, Mr. and Mrs. E. Cline have been faithful workers for both the United and Anglican Churches for well over twenty years and they are both Baptists. Years ago, Shillington was one of the charges of Montieith and the Minister, or Student had to walk or sometimes snowshoe to hold services there as the Montieith road was not kept open during the winter months.
